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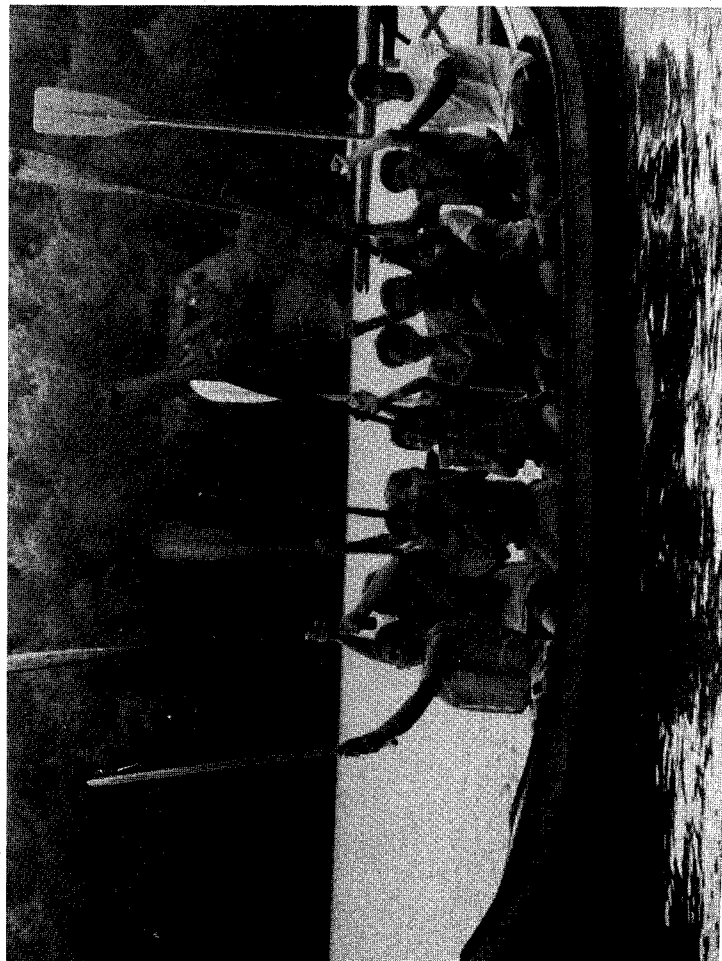

## Mowglis Pack History, 1991

The 1991 Mowglis season was off to a quick start, but the weather was less than cooperative. As was the case for the entire first half of the summer, a wet weekend was followed by a hot, dry week. This pattern was fine for the trip department, which was very busy this summer. The Den rushed off as usual to conquer the mighty Carter range and Akela left for the first Moosilauke base camp trip in recent memory. To stave off any threat of dehydration, plenty of water was drunk and a good time was had by all. The following weeks saw Panther's Mahoosuc trip and Toomai's voyage to Belle Isle, then a journey far north to the Connecticut Lakes by the Den and trips to Nancy Brook by Baloo and the Cubs. Toomai paid another visit to the sawdust piles of Paugus Mills while Panther, split three ways, sped through the Pemigewasset Wilderness and over the Franconia Ridge at a lightning-like speed, covering nearly eleven miles a day. Squad week was soon upon us, and two Akelites missed their first pack trip (along the Montalban Ridge to Mount Washington) because they found themselves on the Gopher Squad. The Balooites made a trip to Sandwich Dome that week, as did the Cubs the week following. Day trips were of course also planned, and with a reawakening interest in trail clearing, more such missions than usual were planned, with the welcome result that the entire Elwell trail and most of its connecting trails received attention of

some sort or another this summer. Back at camp boys and staff were busy working on requirements for their industries and on enjoying the camp's facilities. The new field proved to be versatile, conveniently located and large. Indeed, Akela was finally able to return Mayhew's invitation to a baseball game, allowing us to boast an undefeated season of one win, no losses and one tie. The ropes course was in operation, and all the dormitories, Cubs through Den, were up there at one time or another during the summer.

The Denites were able to host the Onaway Sky-Toppers at the ropes course both at the Independence Day picnic (held on the Sixth of July) and at their own, more intimate gathering. The usual assortment of industries was full of active campers: swimming, canoeing, sailing, rowing, riflery, archery, nature, photography, weather, crafts, camping and axemanship, in approximate geographical order, were all popular activities, as were the newer offerings: windsurfing, ham radio, and, new only as an industry this year, crew — rowing in the shells. With so many trips going out, the staffing in camp was often lean and the Junior staff found themselves taking a more active role than usual in the industries, as well as in dormitory coverage.

Before we knew it we were in the fourth week of camp and Crew Week was soon to be upon us. While the Denites got in their last practice before they went out on the squads and

the other campers began to prepare for the week, Mr. St. John posted the latest edition of his trivia quiz. Old questions reappeared and new ones surfaced, and we asked, as we had of another staff member not too many years ago, "Where does Mr. Merryfield get those cars of his?" The trivia campfire also returned, with refinements: Mowglis trivia questions were interspersed with Trivial Pursuit questions, and the younger dormitories were given questions from a Junior Trivial edition (even though Baloo won last year with questions from the adult version!)

Crew Week was a particularly successful one with truly excellent sportsmanship displayed by the Racing Crews, and indeed by all the camp. Mr. Rick Bengtson and several Junior staff members built an excellent bonfire, if carefully watched because of the dryness of the season. The First Forms also deserve special mention for their hard work and one of the closest and most exciting races the camp has seen. Messrs. Fitzhugh Yeatman and James Bradbury did excellent work leading the boys and staff members of their respective crews. Their leadership proved invaluable to the camp and to the success of the week.

Before we knew it (one would think we would be used to the rapid pace of the summer by now) the final week of camp was upon us. The last mad dash for ribbons for inner circle, requirements for our swimming awards, or targets for a riflery medal was drawing to a close. Graduates dinner, a final trip day (with boys signing up for the destination of their choice), Inner Circle ceremony, and Candlelight service mark the close of the season unmistakably. As we prepare to return home from Mowglis, or as we read this in the winter of 1992 or some year in the future, we look back to the summer of 1991 and think about what we have learned from Mowglis, and about what we have learned about Mowglis.

It has often been said that at Mowglis we try a little harder. We try to maintain higher standards of conduct; we try to excel at those activities for which we have talent, and we try to push ourselves to develop our skills in those areas which are a little more difficult

for us. We learn that we can live without most of the conveniences of modern life. We learn that we can live in a group of people and grow to appreciate different viewpoints, cultures and tastes, whether or not we agree with them.

Mowglis is different from most summer camps. The sense of community lasts a lifetime and spans generations. It seems every Mowglis alumnus has a slightly different reason for why this is so, and in the end, each one is true. The skills, values, and friendships which we develop in learning to live with one another every summer outlast the importance of duties, industries, crew, or hiking. They will be with us for the rest of our lives and will serve us in whatever vocation we may follow. Elizabeth Ford Holt wrote in *The Trail of the Man-Cub* about the path one follows after leaving this camp, and Kipling's Gray Brother says of Mowgli's final parting from the Jungle, "From now on, we follow new trails." Kaa says, "Man goes to Man at the last, though the Jungle does not cast him out." Just as Mowgli's departure from the Jungle was inevitable, so must we all leave this camp eventually, and some will do so for the last time this weekend. As Mrs. Holt wrote in another verse, found above *The Trail of the Man-Cub* in the song book:

"O Mowglis! thy sons have grown sturdy and strong  
Some must part from the Jungle today.  
Their faces are turned to the pathways beyond,  
But their hearts with their brothers will stay."

**GOPHER SQUAD**

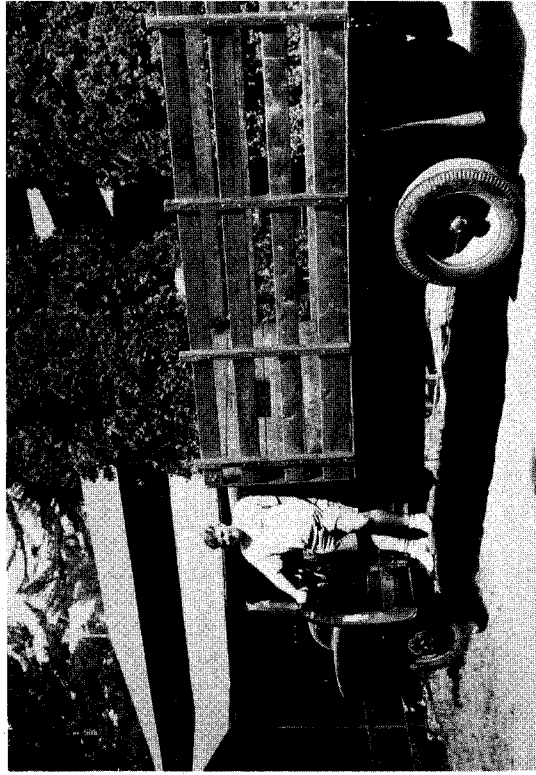

#### FIRST YEAR AT MOWGLIS

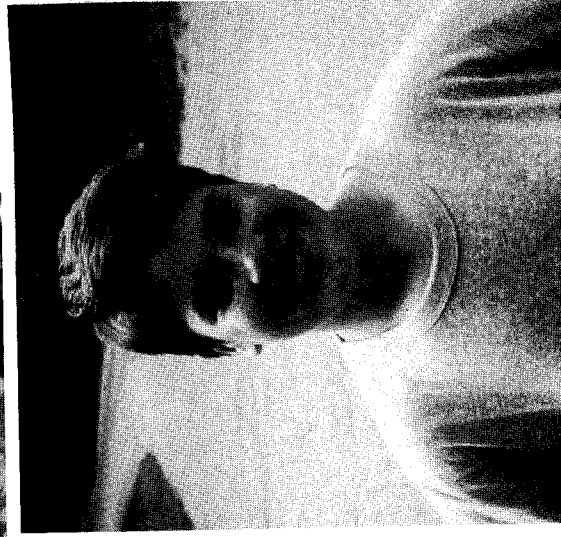

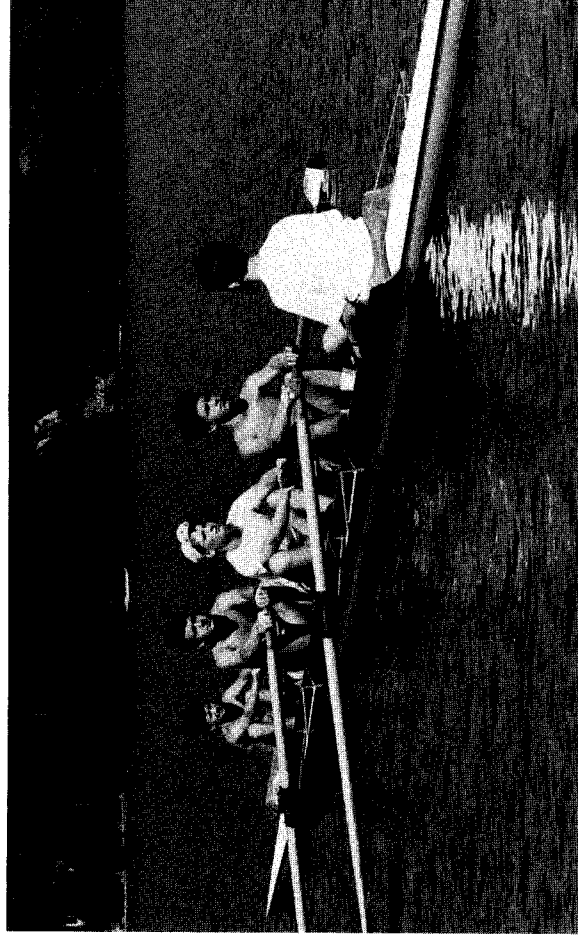
At the end of our three day trip we stopped at Franconia Falls. We had lunch and then went swimming. The water was warmer than usual and we enjoyed going down the water slides.

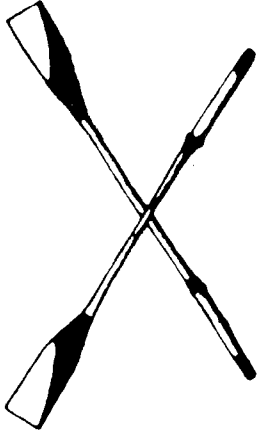
### CREW INDUSTRY

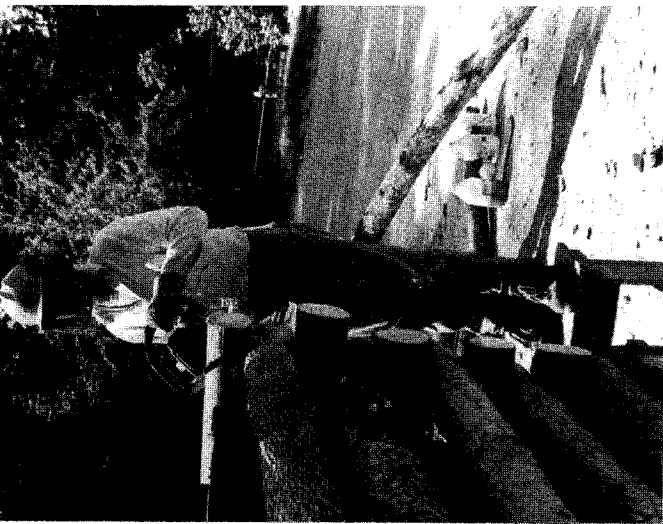
Today we had Clubs and I chose ping pong. I like the challenge of playing different people. It was a lot of fun and I hope to play again next week.

**WELLINGTON TRIP**

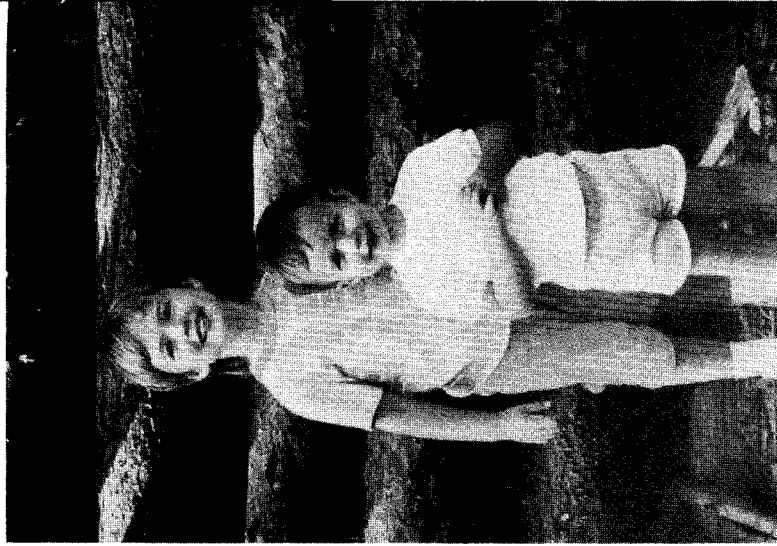
