Mowglis Pack History, 1998

The 1998 Mowglis season opened with a bang. Eight, to be exact, as the Cubs each took their turn sending a blast out across Lake Newfound to signal the opening of another Mowglis summer.

On that sunny day, it was hard to believe that less than twenty-four hours earlier this part of New Hampshire suffered through some of the worst flooding since 1973. Route 3A was at one point closed both north and south of camp, while North Shore Road was similarly blocked. The road to Plymouth remained closed for nearly a week. At camp, the road to the Waterfront and Baloo Cove suffered extensive erosion, while the lake, already high, rose to an unprecedented level. All of this happened the evening and morning before Opening Day.

In spite of this, camp quickly began in earnest. Industries started, the Den backpacked over Garfield and the Franconias, and the first day trips went out. July 4th was upon us in no time. The weekend saw the formation of athletic teams with names such as Aristotle's Albatrosses and Freud's Freaky Flies. A treasure hunt was the competition of the day and the hillside was dotted with Mowglis running off in search of clues cunningly placed by Mr. Morrison and his able assistants. The evening brought the Mowglis premier of "Tomorrow Never Dies" with popcorn and soda enjoyed by

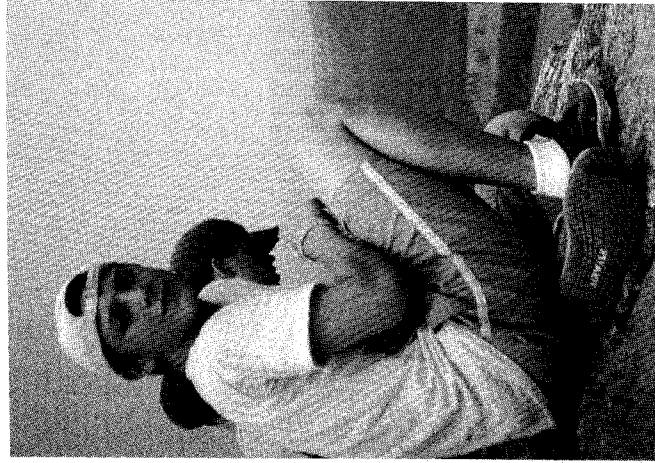
all. Mr. Creamer's fireworks completed a full day.

Campers eager for ribbons busied themselves in industries and signups. The sounds of axes, bandsaws, and 22's filled the air. Green ribboners set up tents and made fires. Swimmers braved the chilly waters which were soon to warm up (and return to normal levels) as July brought warmer temperatures and much drier climes. Denites undertook the restoration of Baloo Cove. Campfires were as varied as the counselors who produced them: Mr. Etuka told us about his native Nigeria, Mr. Sanchez treated us to a slideshow, we heard about current events, had stories read to us,

canoeing demonstration. Finally, an amazing magician and an interesting woman with a number of reptiles came by to spice up our evenings.

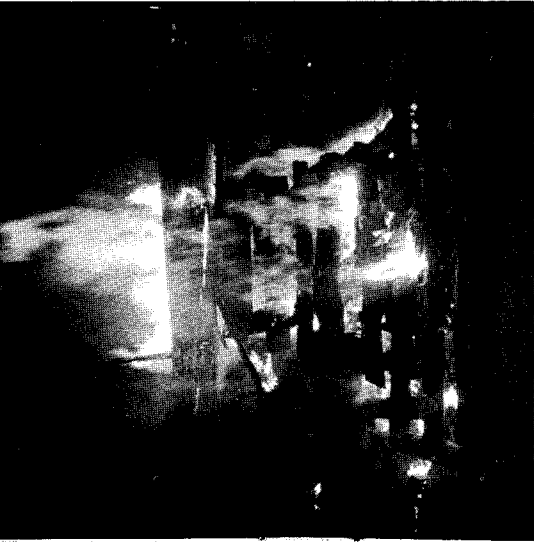
Mowglis trustees past and present shared their tales of Mowglis days of yore during Parents Weekend in mid July. After enjoying Landsports on the lower ballfield, and a fine buffet supper, Mowglis family and friends were treated to an evening's entertainment in Grey Brothers. Mr. Morrison led us through the Mowglis Song Book, ably accompanied by Mr. Bob Bengtson. Campers and Junior Staffers dazzled the audience with their musical virtuosity and comic performances. This night also witnessed the resurrection of the East Hebron Madrigal Society.

Saturday afternoons saw a progression of Landsports, Watersports, and Woodsman's Days, as each team sprinted around the lower ballfield,

wrestled for the watermelon, boiled water, threw a tennis ball for accuracy, canoed and swam through obstacle courses, wielded the two-man saw, jousting on a canoe, and ran the cross-country race (led by fleet-footed Mr. Greer). And, of course, there was the long anticipated and ever enjoyable afternoon spent with the maidens of Onaway, playing volleyball, tossing water balloons, and competing in other arcane events. A good time was had by all. Later in the summer, the Den enjoyed their annual mixer with the Onaway Skytops with a barbecue at the Onaway Waterfront.

Trips went out with a vengeance. After the Den conquered the Franconias, they ventured northwards to the Connecticut Lakes. Panther subdued first the Bonds, highlighted by Bondcliffs and Franconia Falls, and then the Mahosucs, including the infamous notch with its labyrinth of tunnels and boulders. Akela camped at Crawford Notch and backpacked over Moosilauke. Baloo took its overnight at Cardigan, while Toomai bivouacked on Belle Isle. Day trips took on mountains all over New Hampshire, including Welch and Dickey, Sandwiche Dome, Osceola, Moosilauke, Cardigan, Lafayette, Liberty, and Little Haystack. Baloo and Akela also enjoyed a day of mountain biking in Waterville Valley, while Panther took on the indoor climbing wall in Plymouth. Keeping up the hard work of Mowglis past, Den and Panther cleared the Elwell and Bear Mountain trails.

The AMC sent back good reports of our camping parties, and during all the trips, Mowglis boys and staff strove

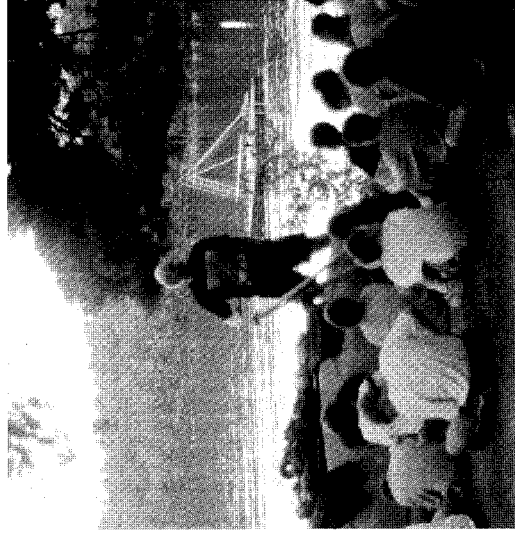


to maintain and improve the good reputation that Mowglis has on the trail. The best hikers were selected to go on the Mt. Washington and Gopher squads, with Pantherites and even two Akelites sharing in the honors. On these trips, the boys enjoyed the good food and comfortable lodgings provided by the AMC huts. The Mt. Washington Squad tackled all of the Presidentials in the traditional four-day, south-to-north route. The Gophers elected to climb Washington itself, and then headed over the northern Presidentials and out by the same route as the Mt. Washington Squad. Although the weather and views were not always perfect, judging from their smiles (and photographs) when they returned, a good time was had by both squads.

With the squads back in camp, we barely had time to catch our breath before Crew Week was upon us. The Mowglis Armada had been training under the direction of Mr. Greer since the third week of camp, but now it was time to get serious. Mr. Lacey ably led the Blue Crew, while Mr. Rafferty rallied the Red. Pep rallies, countoffs, and skis were the order of the week, with constant practice on the lake, as each crew geared up for the big day. The excitement of the bonfire was augmented by the arrival of the Hebron Fire Department with Mr.

Creamer on board. Although the Red Crew appreciated the color of the fire truck, the Blues took delight in Mr. Creamer's being doused by his fellow volunteer firemen. The fire had been so ably built by Mr. Gutherz and the Junior Staff (complete with a vintage and dilapidated Mowglis dinghy on top), that Mr. Creamer was the only thing that needed any dousing. Crew Day followed with a fine parade highlighted by the magnificent Blue Dragon built by Msrs. Muller and Ragan, the Red's flashy BMW convertible (compliments of trustee, Charlie Feuer), Mr. Rafferty's red jeep, yet another red fire engine, and the strange appearance of the Red Drum with the Blue Crew (it was later returned to its rightful owners). Three forms took to the waters of Newfound with the Blue winning the third and second, with the Red prevailing in the first. The latter was a hard fought battle, which had the look and feel of a racing crew contest.

Anticipation built to a peak as Parents, alumni, guests, campers,



and staff awaited the start of the final race of the day. Rumor had it that the Red Racing Crew might threaten the camp record of 3:13 (set in 1971). To heighten the drama, one of the members of that '71 crew, trustee Steve Minich, was watching the

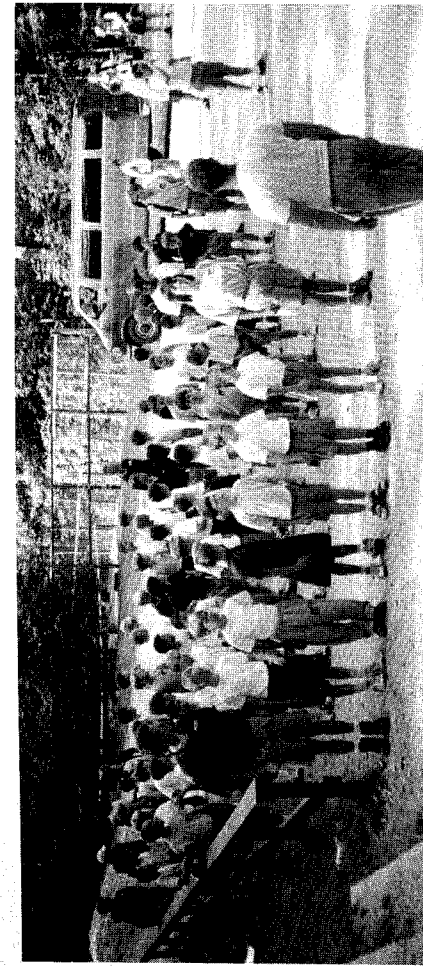
Bengtson coordinated a down-to-the-wire ribbon blitz for Denites and Inner Circle hopefuls; and the soon-to-be graduates of Den were treated to an outstanding dinner orchestrated by Chef Pete Dillon and Mrs. Morgan, our Cub Mother. At this last event, Mr. Platt read to the graduates from the 1904 Mowglis COD Camp Record, reminding us all, that much of what was meaningful to the early Mowglis continues to be dear to us to this day.



After dinner, many tall tales of Mowglis were shared in the Jungle House, including some special stories by former camper and counselor, Pete St. John. As this evening drew to a close, all present joined in a stirring rendition of the Graduates Hymn.

As we gather here tonight, one last time, nestled securely among the pines, think back over the spirit of this summer and what it has meant to you. Our words alone cannot hope to capture the spirit of Mowglis. The spirit, as one Mowglis said, more than twenty years ago, "of all of us during the past summer trying to build a small community of our own, with values based on the hard thought-out ideals of many years."

It may seem sad to leave all the windsurfing and sailing-all the tennis and hiking-all the riflery and archery-all the campfires and Saturday nights. It would be nice to relive the excitement of Crew Week or the hilarious moments of the Zamboni Brothers. It would thrill us to once more view the breathtaking beauty gazing out over the Bonds or the



race from the launch as one of the judges. The battle began with early reports of a Red Crew half-length lead, but when the crews passed in front of the Hope-to-Be dock it seemed as if the Blues had the lead and the Reds appeared to be struggling. As they entered the final strokes of the race, the Red Crew put on a phenomenal charge while the Blues doggedly tried to hold their slight edge. All of a sudden the race was over and a hush descended on the crowd, as no one knew who had prevailed. After a brief discussion among the judges, it was determined that the race had been too close to call and that for the first time since 1979 the Racing Crews had finished in a dead heat. A tie is probably the ultimate test of sportsmanship, and both crews rose to the challenge, as we watched the unusual sight of two oars being hoisted up the flagpole and sang the Mowglis Boating Song.

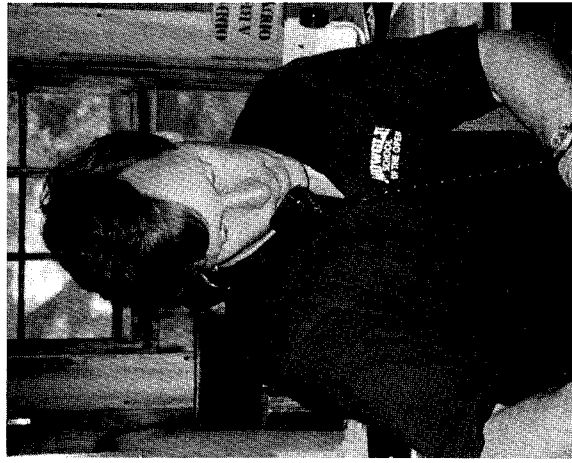

Strength and unity brought all Mowglis together once more. The East Hebron Madrigal Society once again brought tuneful delight to all, especially with a guest appearance by Mowglis legend Pete Hoogenboom. The comic

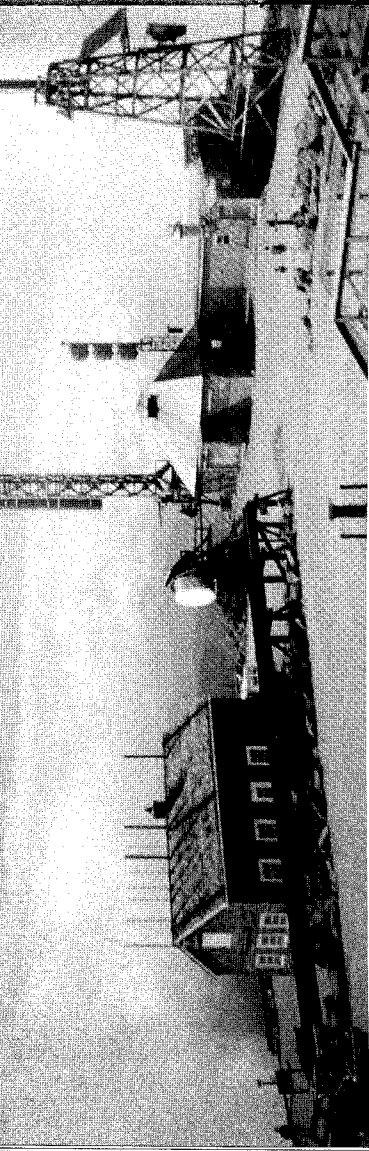
Presidentials. It would lift our spirits to again hear the Brass Choir in the chapel. It would be great fun to play another tetherball game.

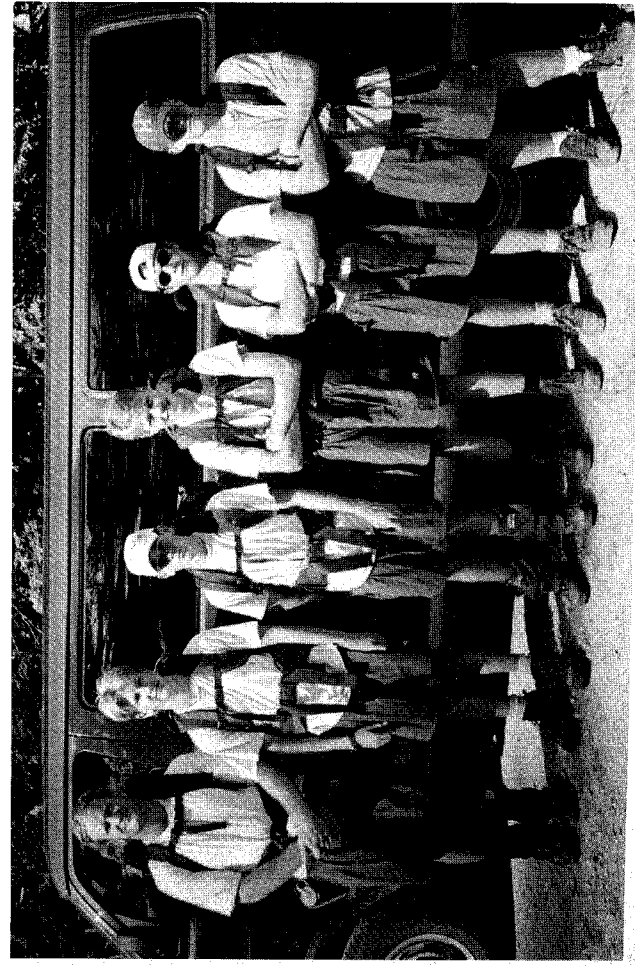


MT. WASHINGTON SQUAD

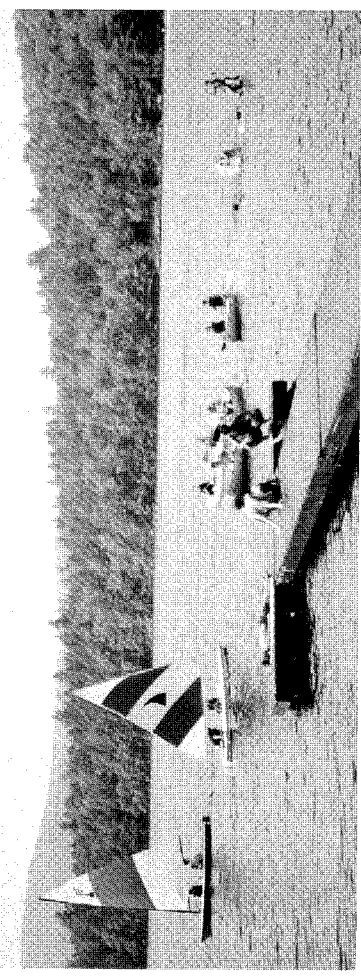

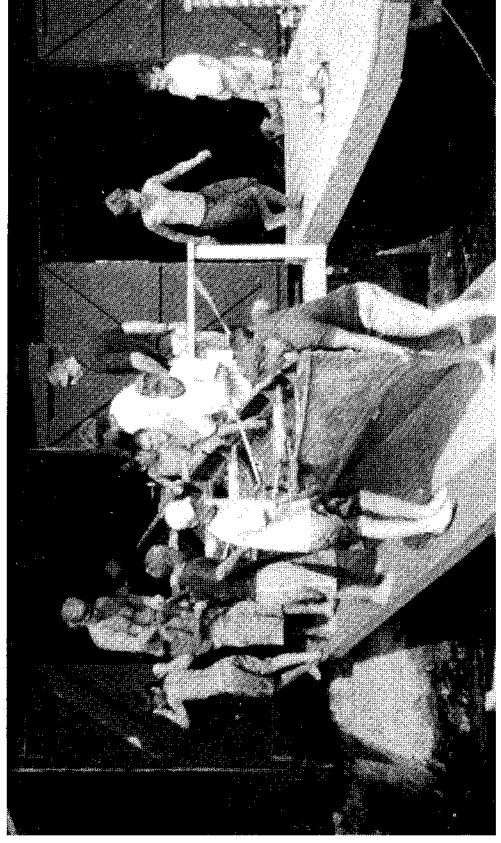

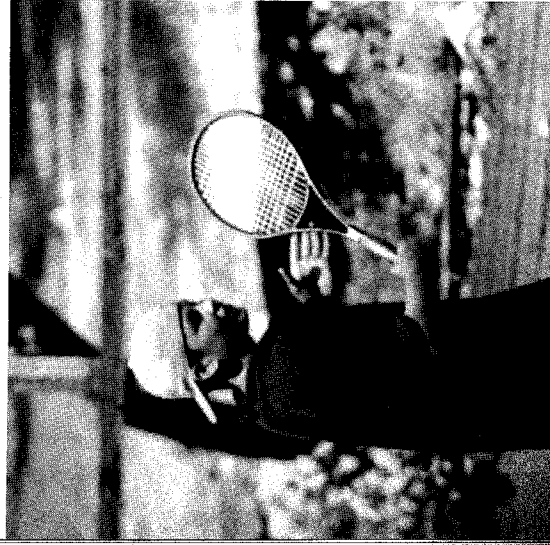

FRANCONIA RIDGE

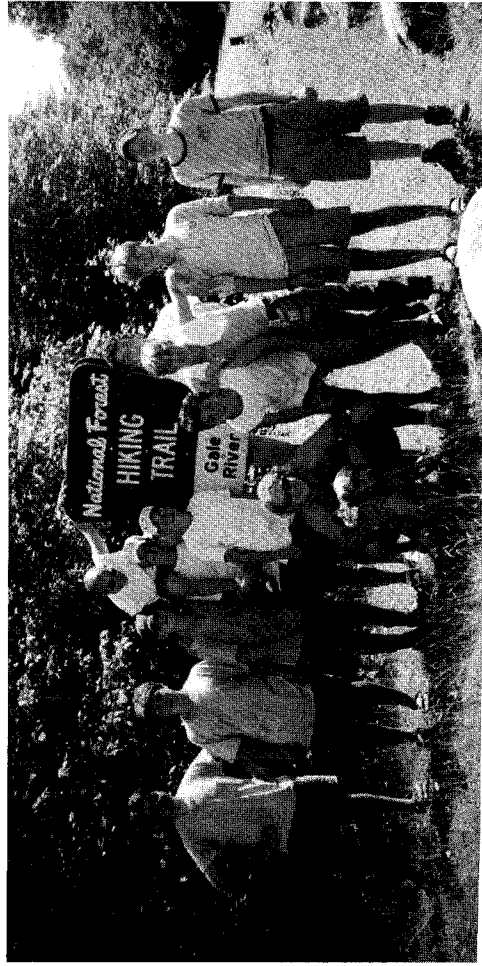

MT. MOOSILAUKE

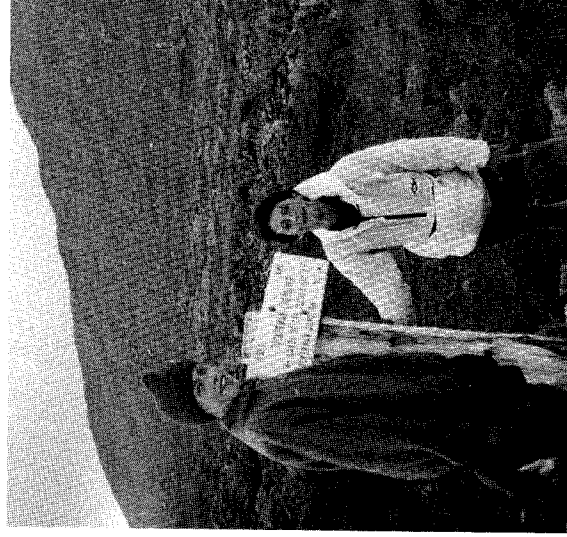
