Mowglis Pack History, 1999

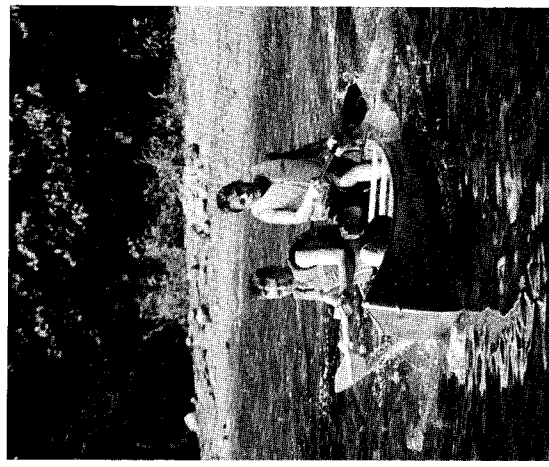
A bright and sunny afternoon was the setting on Grey Brothers field as the Cubs fired the 1910 Winchester cannon to open Mowglis' 95th season. While others in distant cities complained of uncomfortably warm temperatures this summer, those of us fortunate to be here in East Hebron, never found the waters of Newfound Lake to be more welcoming or our trips more enjoyable.

Ably guided by our veteran Tripmaster, Mr. James Bradbury, and Assistant Tripmaster, Mr. Ethan Feuer, Baloo led off the trips with a canoeing excursion to Lake Umbagog, followed by Den's assault of the Carter-Moriah range. Panther was quick to follow with backpacks over the Kinsmans, while Toomai camped at Sandwich Mountain. Cubs, led by Ms. Hutchinson and Mr. Muller, followed suit with their paddle to Belle Isle, which included an adventure in a thunderstorm. With the trips program in full swing, Den undertook the challenge of pioneering a new four-day canoeing expedition to the Moose River, led by our Watermaster, Mr. Welch. This year the Junior Staff set out on their own canoe trip up the Androscoggin River. Good weather held steady all summer long as Akelites scaled the Kilkenny Ridge, Toomai claimed Belle Isle for their own, and Panther conquered the Mahoosucs.

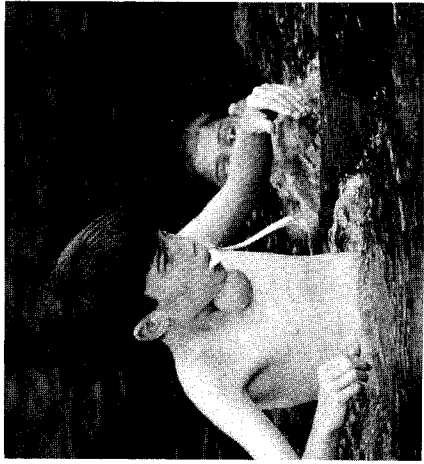
Meanwhile, hands were not idle back in camp. Our waterfront staff challenged boys to achieve their

personal best in swimming while striving to attain their white ribbons. Mr. Muller and Mr. Ragan kept the craft shop humming, with hard-working Mowglis creating a variety of projects, including marionettes, clay whistles, wooden boxes and candle boats. Mrs. Bengtson taught a special drawing and watercolor workshop. Green Ribboners led by Mr. Chad Bradbury, learned useful survival and camping skills as well as proper conduct on the trail. Though the days were dry, each earnest Green Ribboner harked to the challenge of "Fire in the Rain," under Mr. Bradbury's expert guidance.

Miss Almond directed boys in the newly revived Drama industries for several enjoyable evening perform-



ances. The Junior and Senior Tennis Ladders were running in short order, thanks to Mr. Wetmann's instruction and the refurbishing of the lower tennis court. Mr. Piotr put the Mowglis mariners through their paces in sailing, while Mr. Smith began the process of training the Mowglis crews. Under the watchful eyes of Messrs., Creamer, Welch, Hulme and Kuhrmeier, waterskiing and windsurfing industries also flourished at the Waterfront.



Mr. José Medina-Mora and Mr. Harper guided the burgeoning enthusiasm of our many canoeists. Mowglis legend, Mr. Charlie Walbridge, returned to camp to find that those in the hunt for the Red Ribbons were not lacking in either skill or determination, as he led them through the turbulent waters of the Pemigewasset. The lower ballfield was skillfully transformed into Sherwood Forest as Mowglis archers were ably trained by Mr. Ruben "Hood" Muñoz.

Mr. O'Dell and Mr. Lucas resurrected the darkroom this season, to provide photography enthusiasts the opportunity to develop their own prints. Young axemen progressed in their skills led by Mr. Tracy, while Mr. Rozo and Mr. Hard supervised the activity at the rifle range. Coached by Mr. Muller, Mowglis Croquet enthusiasts groomed the court, and once again took to their mallets and wickets. As the season progressed, Mr. Muñoz fired up an exciting basketball

tournament, ably assisted by Mr. Feuer. Mrs. Morgan led several successful fishing excursions throughout the season.

Mr. Morgan and Mr. Platt woke up the camp in patriotic style July 4th with stirring renditions of the Star Spangled Banner and Yankee Doodle Dandy. Mr. Creamer once again insured that Mowglis' celebration of the Fourth of July was marked with dazzling fireworks. Mother Nature had a few firecrackers of her own to discharge as one of our large pines adjacent to the Croquet Court, made a loud but harmless crash to the ground following an evening of strong winds.

Many Mowglis alumni came to visit this summer. One of our favorite guests was Mr. Steve Drogin, a former camper and counselor. He treated us to two campfires, featuring slides from his recent travels to Africa and the South Pacific Seas. Mr. Steve Minich also came by to share his expertise in journalism with his televised reports about Mt. Washington and the Canadian Appalachian Trail. In both instances, young Mowglis were encouraged to shoot for the stars and follow their own dreams of adventure and discovery.

Other special campfires included a magician, strength training and conditioning with Mr. Chad Bradbury, the culture of Spain with Mr. Muñoz, interpreting Native American culture with Mr. Trip O'Dell, and tales of Poland with Mr. Piotr.

Each dorm was eager and quick to prove its musical prowess whether in the dining hall, on stage, or at a Jungle House tea. Whether it was "Show Me the Scotchman," "Friday Night When We Set Sail," "My Castle on the River Nile," or one of the many dorm songs, voices rang strong and clear throughout the summer, climaxing with the traditional chants and songs of Crew Week.

Chapel talks this season asked us to treat each other with honesty and consideration, to not overlook the small, yet often very important details in camp life, and to appreciate Mowglis and make the most of the

opportunities given to each camper who is a part of this community. Mr. Creamer emphasized the importance of mutual respect. Mr. O'Dell challenged us to seek honor in our actions at Mowglis, while Mr. Ragan encouraged us to strive for individuality and to be true to ourselves.

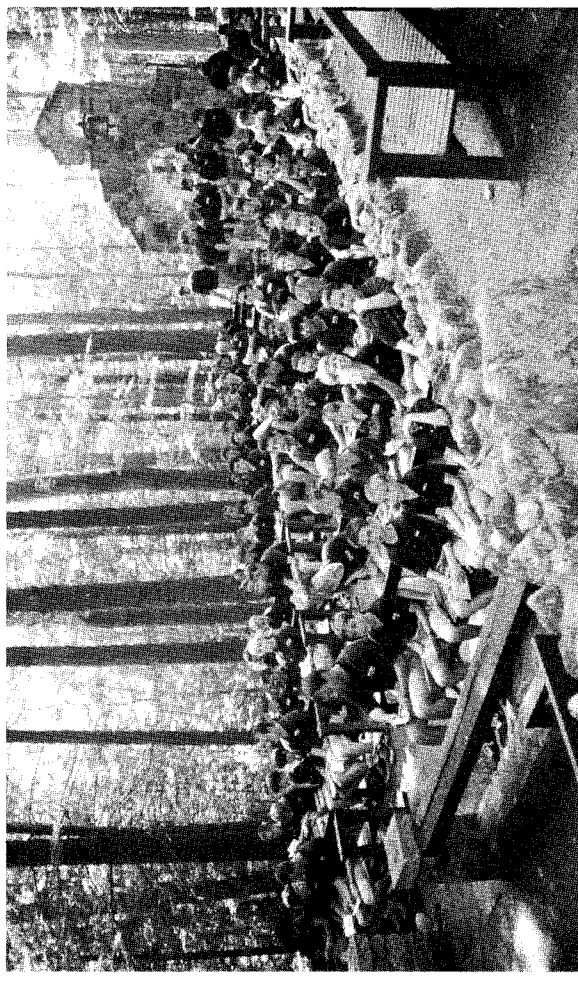

Thanks to each and every member of the camp, we began a new recycling program at Mowglis and have been able to save a great quantity of cardboard, plastic, glass and metal. You did not wait until Crew Week to manifest the ideals of strength and unity. Den set the example early on in the season when they paddled the Cubs out to Belle Isle and kept close watch over them there during a fierce thunderstorm.

July 17 was about as hot and humid as we could ask for. A perfect day for Landsports Day and parents weekend.

Numerous new and wonderful events were added to the standard Landsports repertoire this season. Family and alumni were treated to another outstanding dinner in the dining hall from Pollo Pete. Brigadier General Douglas V. O'Dell honored us with his commanding presence, as he led our Colors ceremony. Magnificent entertainments followed in Grey Brothers, including numerous dramatic presentations, highlighted by the Cubs play, "The Three Little Wolves and the Big Bad Pig." Chris Cronin played on the oboe. Mr. Bob Bengtson played music by Saint-Saëns, and as ever accompanied us in our beloved Mowglis Camp songs, led by Mr. Platt. The East Hebron Madrigal Society dusted off their music to sing "Wake Freshmen, Wake" and "The Pope," with Mr. Arthur Bradbury, Mrs. Mawhinney and Mrs. Platt joining our forces. WHERE MY SHOES WENT THIS SUMMER

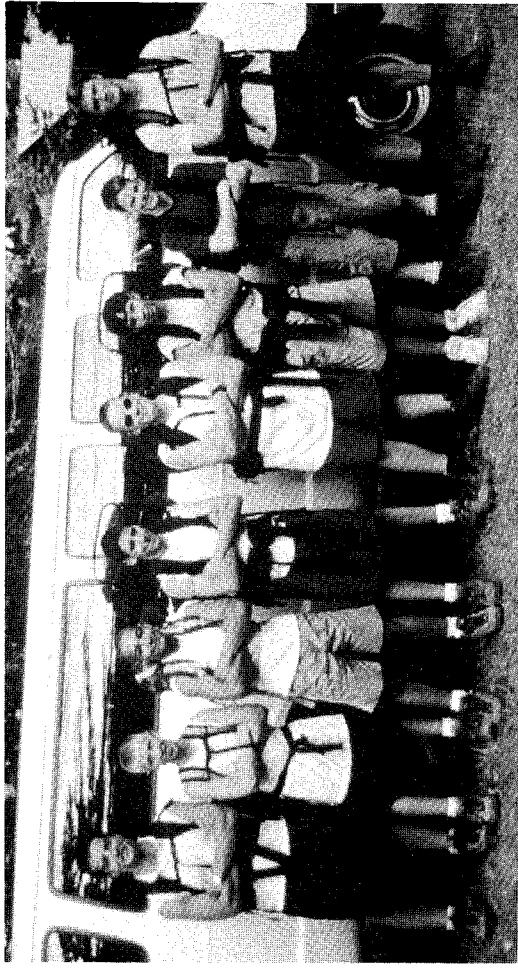

CRAB SOCCER MATCH

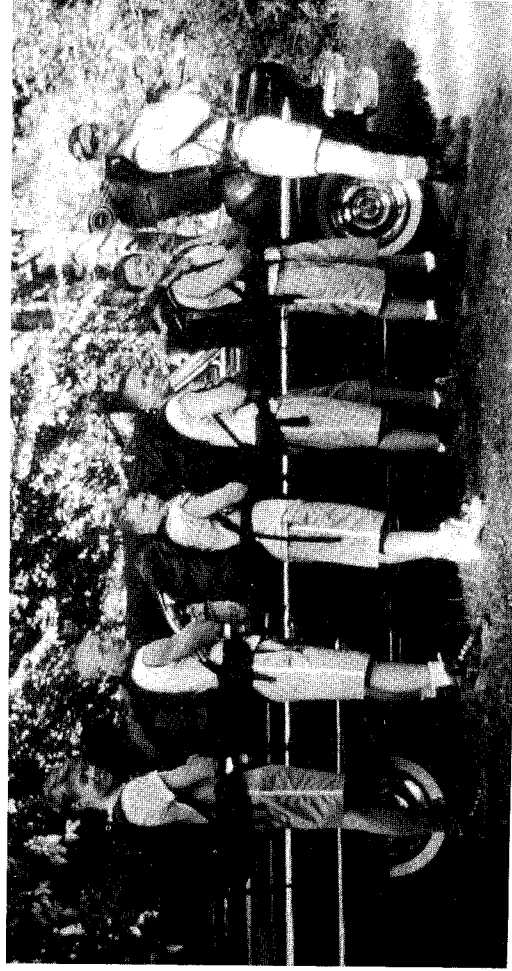

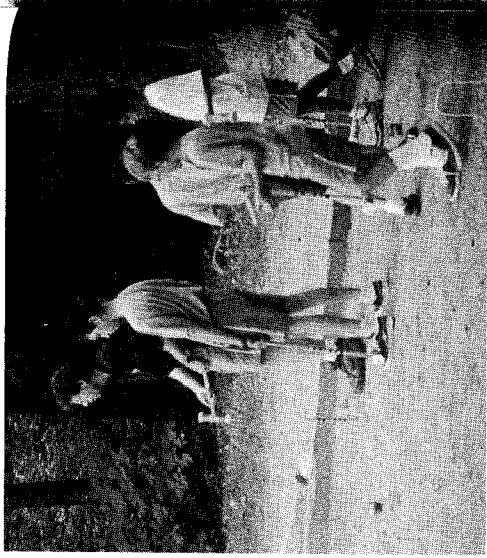

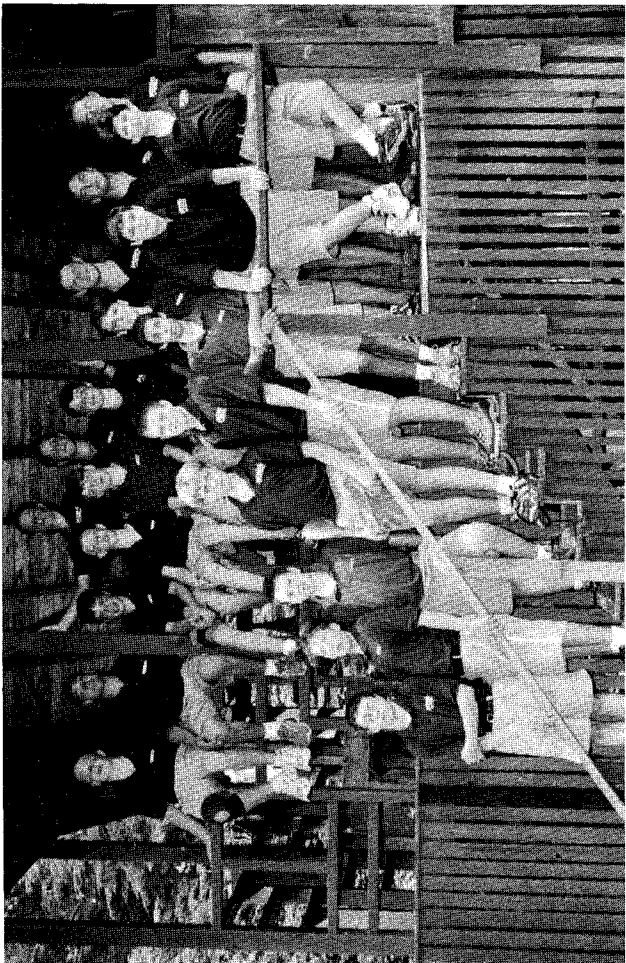
MT. OSCEOLA

THOMAS MOORE

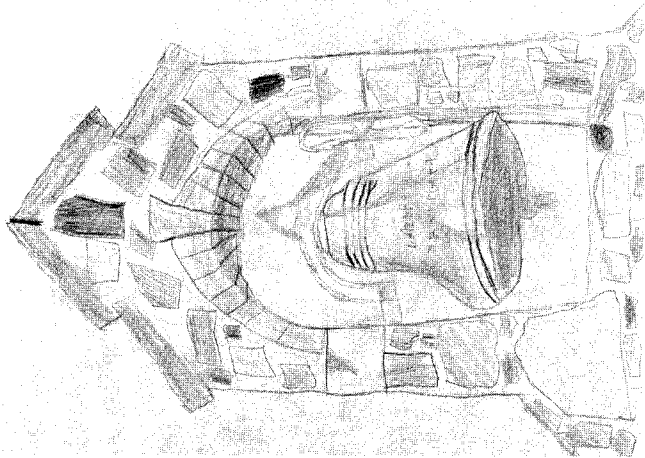
BALOO TRIP

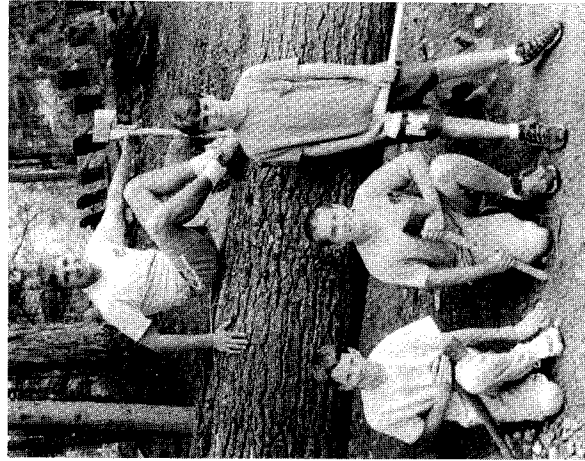
CLUBS

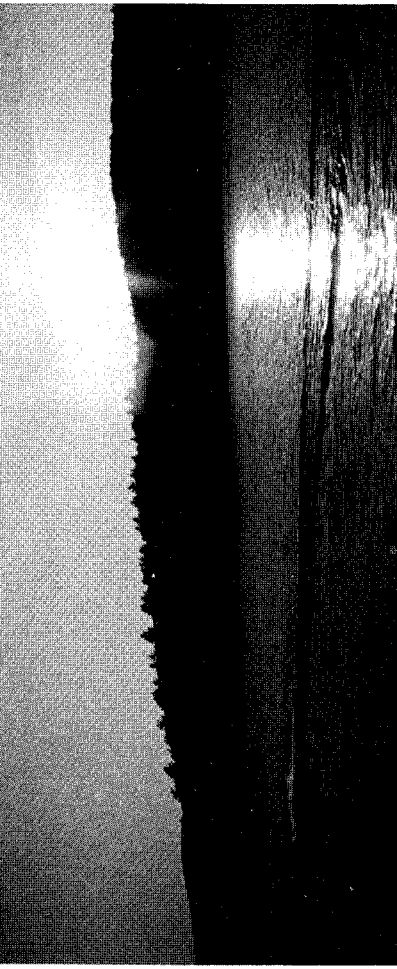
SAILING

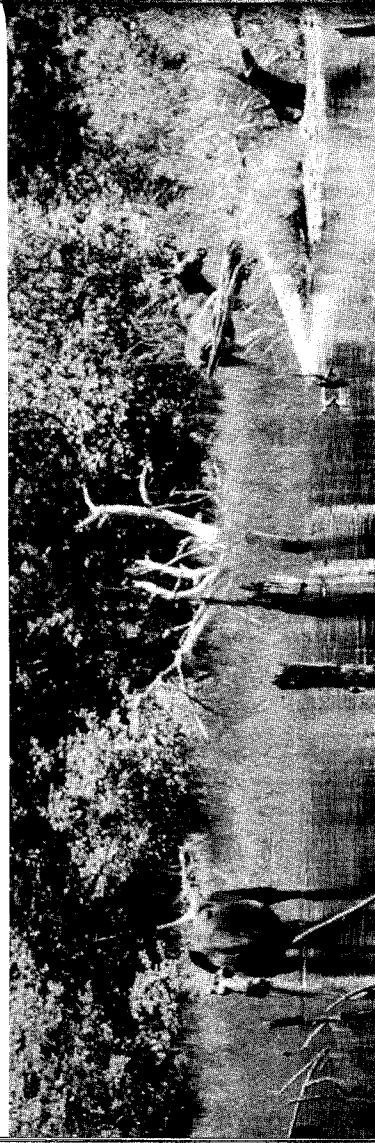
