After the boom of the cannon had run to Cardigan with a roar, and a yellow Gremlin had run into the trees by the incinerator with a crash on opening day, the boys and staff of the 1983 Mowglis season settled into the routine of a summer no less exciting, if slightly less noisy.

Trips were off at once; three or four day trips interspersed with the usual day excursions. Under the leadership of Alpinist "Pierre of the Mountains", the Den assaulted the Carters with vigour and extra belts to accommodate the obstacles on Mount Height. Despite a heavy rainfall on the first day, Panther travelled the Mahoosucs with style, doubtless to the international flavor of both groups, and Akela enjoyed the base camp trip at Nancy Brook, taking in Crawford and Nancy Mountains, and a dip in the Saco River. Baloo sharpened rock climbing skills on Cardigan amidst the blueberries, and Toomai frolicked on the sawdust piles at Pagus Mills before ascending Mount Chocorua. These trips cemented dormitory unity as we learned to function as a group, and we returned to Mowglis to prove our worth in other directions.

Industries were a lot of fun, but still very exacting. Mowglis sailors took to the water egged on by Catalanian exclamations, and when on shore they rewrote the Mowglis songs their own way, and sang them on a Saturday even-

ing. The hardy crew in axemanship applied the skills of splitting, chopping, and felling to anything that wasn't moving on the slopes of Plymouth Mountain, and despite numerous blisters they all made it back alive. Mowglis photographers deduced that the ghost visible in the 1913 photograph might not have been one, possibly! Blue Ribboners needed no abacus to figure out we had unsurpassed weather this summer.

Athletic teams participated in all kinds of events, from soccer to canoe swamping and water polo, culminating in Landsports, Watersports, and Woodsmans Days. Competition was fierce, and at times Messrs. Graff and Merrill found the logistics of planning events for eight teams even fiercer, but all went smoothly, and honors were evenly won.

A second round of trips went out. The Den paddled on the Androscoggin River and put in much work on the ultimate tan, Panther eased on down the Montalbans, Akela took to the water on the Saco, and first for that dorm, and Baloo canoed on the Pemigewasset River, and survived to tell the tale.

Squad week was suddenly upon us, and the Gopher and Washington Squads set out on their demanding trips in fine weather. We suddenly realized that the goals we had set for the summer were within reach with just a couple of short weeks ahead. Awards and ribbons began to be announced in greater numbers in the dining hall, as boys sought

Inner Circle and Graduation Requirements, and one intrepid graduate his Wolf's Paw.

Athletic team loyalty was superseded by crew loyalty with the onset of crew week, and once again the vintage twin crew boats, named for the twins Alcott Farrar and Stanley Burce Elwell, were put afloat. The Blues carried the day for the fourth consecutive year in an exciting race rowed well by both crews, and once again the Blue Strokes oar was raised up the flagpole as we sang the Boating Song. The end of crew week left just one week to scramble for accomplishments, as the eventful final days drew nigh.

The Graduate's Dinner, Inner Circle Ceremony, Tennis and Archery Finals, and Candle-boats quickly led to Mrs. Holt's Day. The Brass Choir sounded one last time as Mr. Bengtson played the organ for the Candlelight Service. Although we kept busy to the end, it is certain that every Mowglis found a moment to reflect on the summer gone by, and we didn't have to concentrate very hard to conjure up visions of good times had in the dorms, or at clubs, or at soaks, or whenever.

HIKING

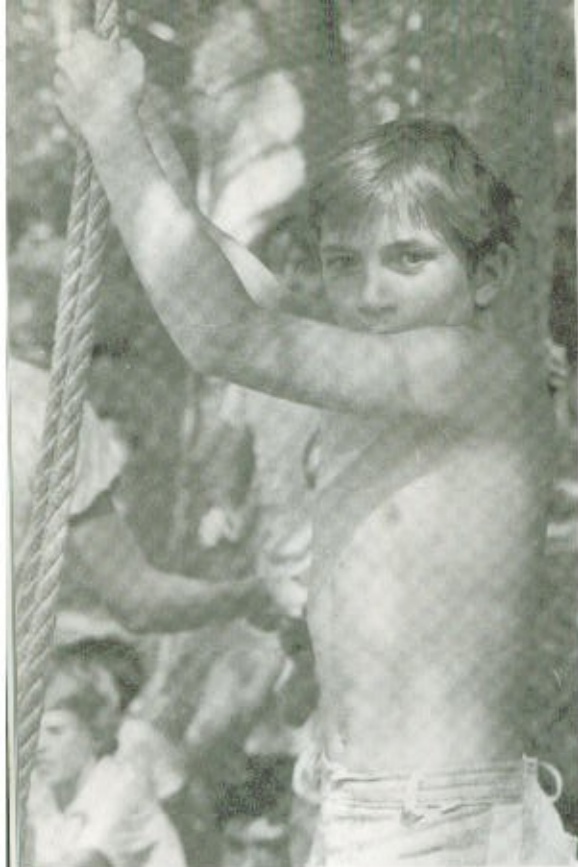

SATURDAY CAMPFIRE

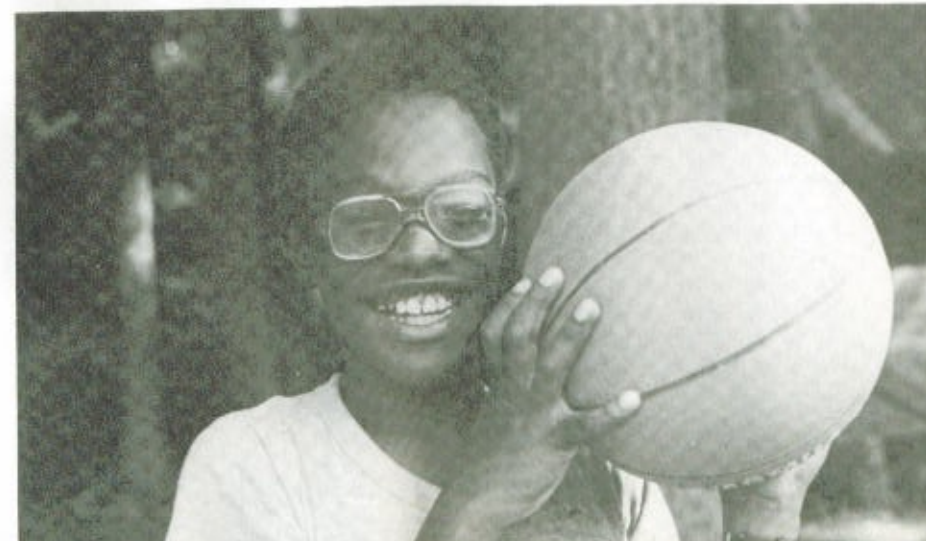

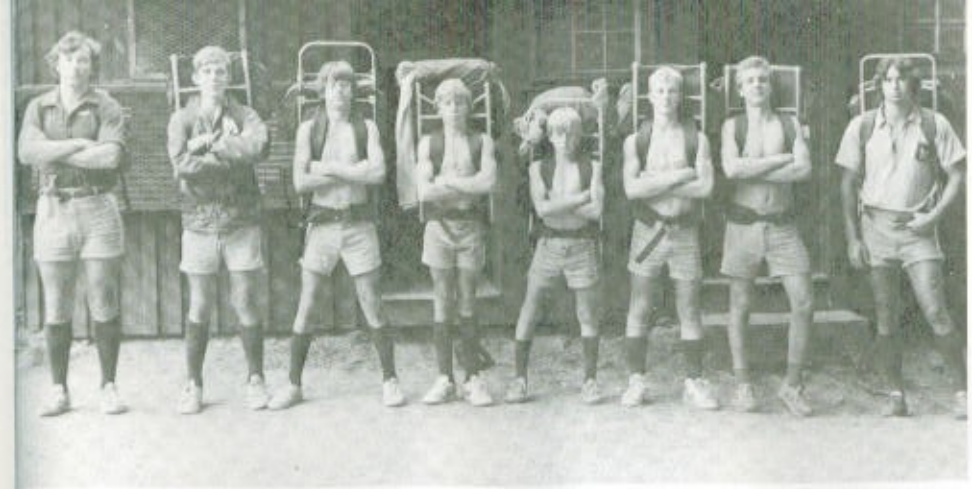
SUNDAY EVENING

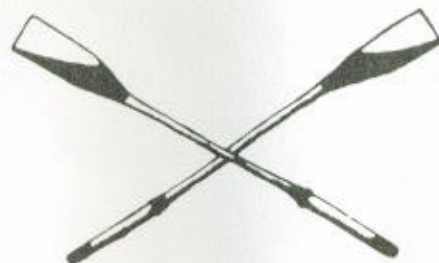

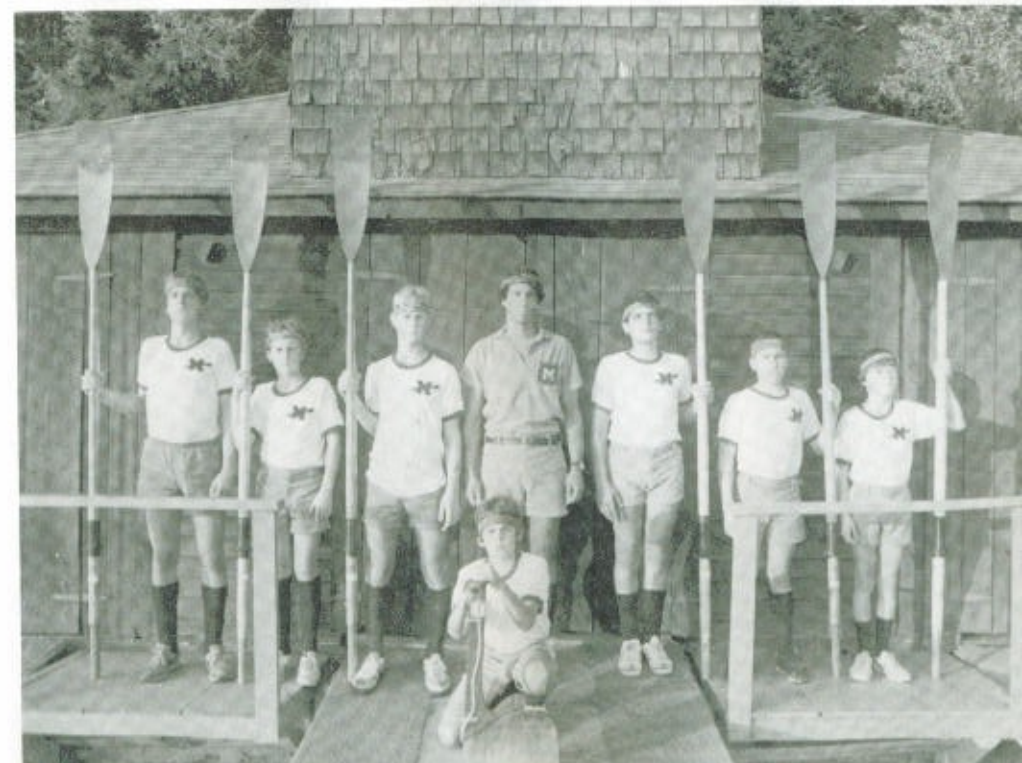

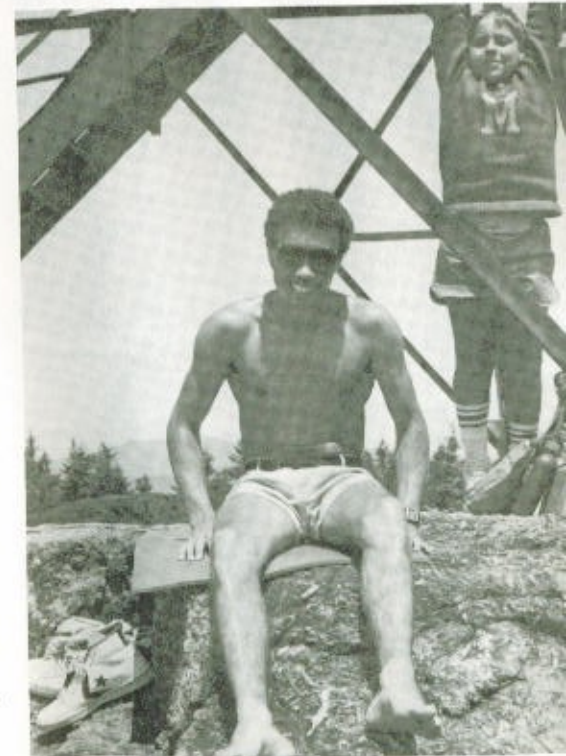
