

Mowglis Pack History, 1986

The 1986 Mowglis season was one of many strange and remarkable events, the first of which took place in Philadelphia, when Franklin Williams arrived on time at the travel party departure point for the second consecutive year. The travel party went on to arrive an entire and unprecedented hour early, and the boys disembarked ready for another season of excitement and accomplishment, even if it meant getting wetter than usual, for it must be mentioned: We had our share of rain. And as if that were not enough, we also had a hailstorm, when for minutes on end we watched as the camp was pelted by marbles of ice, larger than any there had ever seen. But rain or shine, all industries met and worked busily. The White Ribboners swam endless laps at the waterfront, the Nature Industry scrutinized the lifestyles of local chipmunks, and the woods rang with the sound of yet another stately pine being subdivided by the Axemanship Industry. Daisuke Yamazaki fired shot after shot aiming for his Red White and Blue Ribbon, Soren deNiord attempted a topspin on his tennis ball, and Jamie Bradbury was beginning to realize he was running out of ribbons to earn. Overnight trips began right at the start of the season, as the Den divided into two groups to conquer the Carter Range. Due to atmospheric conditions, both groups were faced with challenges aplenty as they dodged lightening bolts along the ridge of Middle Carter, but even that did not seem as pressing an

issue as that of what their staff would prepare for the evening meal. Panther was graced with extremely good weather on their two pack trips to Mount Carrigan and to the Mahoosucs, and Akela went to Mount Cardigan and to the Montalban Ridge, a trip which culminates at Mount Washington, from the summit of which the boys were able to "phone home". Toomai went to Paugus Mills and Mount Chocorua as well as to Mount Cardigan, and were given a bonus trip to Belle Island, which they reached in one of the camp's new 25' war canoes. Baloo headed to Waterville Valley and Sandwich Dome, and they also enjoyed a leisurely canoe trip down the Saco River, an experience shared by the Den on a more demanding scale as they attacked the rapids on the Androscoggin River.

There was always something new going on to break up the normal routine of camp life: Mr. Walbridge, a Mowglis graduate and former staff member gave a fascinating lecture/demonstration about white water canoeing and equipment, a waterslide appeared on Landsports Day, and was back by popular demand on Woodmans Day, tennis stars like Becker and McEnroe were seen close up by those boys in the Tennis Industry chosen to go to the Volvo Tennis Tournament, and the caretaker of the Old Man of the Mountain presented the boys with a closer look at the best known symbol of New Hampshire during campfire. The Junior Staff made frequent trail clearing expeditions along

the Elwell Trail and its subsidiaries for which Mowglis assumes responsibility, and the Aides had an unforgettable trip with Clyde Smith, a former Tripmaster and now a Trustee, hiking and canoeing in the Connecticut Lakes region in New Hampshire's northernmost tip.

The weeks sped by, and all were surprised to find squad week upon us. The honor squads had plenty of the kind of weather to which they had become accustomed but did find the atmosphere in the AMC Huts to be sunny and warm. And suddenly it was Crew Week. The atmosphere, made colorful by the Red and Blue bandannas, grew more tense and exciting as the week progressed and the crew newspapers began appearing, and skits were put on in the dining room. The day itself featured a grand parade from the Crafts Shop down to the waterfront. which included a red and a blue sportscar and the Grand Marshall, Mr. Don Merrill, being towed in a rowboat by Officer Phaneuf in the tractor. The crew leaders were carried in sedan chairs, and

both camp trucks made an appearence as well. The race itself, so nearly postponed by an unreasonable rainstorm, was extremely close and very exciting, with the Reds claiming the victory for the second year in a row.

The end of Crew Week left only eight days to finish up ribbon and graduation requirements, but although the pace was hectic there was still time to play a game of tetherball, or to watch the breathtaking ping pong match between the Director and the Assistant Director, or to reflect on the summer gone by. Whether Mr. Dietz ever did hold his Kite Flying Club, how many answerable questions were in the Mowglis Trivia Ouiz, and where on earth Mr. Hoogenboom got that car of his will remain hidden in Mowglis history. What is clear is that the summer was full of achievement, friendship and fun, and that the intangible known as Mowglis spirit is as strong as it ever was.




