Mowglis Pack History, 1987

It was only 51 days ago that the 1987 opening day ceremony took much longer than usual owing to the remarkable number of nineteen Cubs pulling on the firing string of the 1910 Winchester cannon. As the echoes roared back from Cardigan we all looked around, catching the eves of old friends and remembering the fun of last summer as we looked forward to a new summer of new friends and new achievement. A strongly veteran staff took up positions at their respective industries and in no time the camp was in full swing. The axemanship industry roamed the forest in search of likely subjects under the leadership of Mr. Bradbury, while the tennis courts retained the traditional liveliness only to be expected from the Messrs. Stolle and Laya. The weather this summer was glorious with an endless succession of hot days making the waterfront a very popular place. Most campers bettered their swimming status and put it to immediate use during soaks, and the Mowglis fleet of sailboats, rowboats and canoes was in constant use. Trips this year were an enormous success. The Den went on a four day pack trip to the Carters armed with heavy duty bungee cords for the perils of Mt. Hight, and the Pantherites took on Mt. Carrigan and took in the view from the observation platform at the summit - one of the finest in the White Mountains. Akela went to Nancy Brook and Mount Crawford on a base camp trip and went swimming on the Saco, where the mountain water was found to be ''refreshing''. Toomai went to Mount Chocorua with Mr. Vitacco

who taught them a countoff only he could understand, and Baloo went canoeing on the Saco, to the delight of all the staff assigned. Back in camp, the daily routine assured maximum productivity, but there were always new things in store which made for lots of variety. Mr. Bradbury's karate campfire was certainly an eyeopener for everyone, and it was about that time that the word "mister" would be much more clearly spoken in his vicinity. Mr. Bill Cummings arrived with his 1911 Cadillac and told us about its renovation, and Mr. John Knott came to speak about his profession of gunsmith. Certainly none will forget the Fourth of July extravaganza with water basketball, an all camp egg toss, and the largest open pit barbecue in Mowglis history with sodas for all. The Saturday evening entertainments held their admittedly captive audiences spellbound. The Madrigal Society was in rare and different form each week as its various members trickled back from a prolonged world tour; Mr. Hoogenboom having been away the longest owing to a song recital in the Grange Hall in Munson Flats, Arizona. David Master gave a stunning performance on the piano and Natsuki Nishino showed equal prowess on the solo violin. Several dorms performed skits and a thunderous welcome was given Mr. Merrill and Co. for their rendition of "Where Oh Where Were You Last Night". A second round of trips went out: Toomai to Mt. Cardigan where the blueberries were just peaking, Baloo to Sandwich Dome and a vigorous hike with Mr.

Prud'homme, the Den to an effortless and relaxing glide down the Androscoggin, Panther to another pack trip, this time for four days in the Mahoosucs for matchless weather and a snowball fight in July, and Akela for a trailclearing expedition in the Mt. Cardigan region, where Mowglis maintains over thirty miles of trail. In camp, the Junior Staff worked hard to clear a vista from Grav Brothers Field down to the water with the help of some of the huskier campers and relaxed from their efforts in the camp's four man shell. Squad week was on us before we knew it. The Washington and Gopher Squads each took on challenging hikes in the Presidential Range, and the Washington Squad, this year comprised of four elite hikers, racked up an impressive 40 miles. With the squads out, the end of camp was in sight, and the boys strove to finish up requirements in the Crafts Shop, from which some very strange shapes began emerging, and at the Rifle Range, run by the Messrs. Hoogenboom, Merryfield and Williams with an iron hand, and at the Archery Range where Mr. Clement, federally expressed from West Virginia, had arrived to take the reins. The green ribboners tried to figure out how to build a fire while under fire from the garden hose, and Mr. Herring had them swamp the canoes one more time just to ensure they got it right. With the outset of Crew Week we all looked around to wonder what had become of the Blue Crew, quite drastically outnumbered by the Reds. But both crews seemed equally loud during all the cheering, which intensified as the week went on. As Mr. Rick Bengtson's bonfire got bigger and bigger with the help of Mr. Herring and Bonfire Bill Natale, so did the level of excitement. The Blues took the day in a tremendously close race, and then all rivalry was immediately forgotten - a Mowglis tradition of which we are all very proud. The last week of camp was just as full of interest and excitement. The Junior Staff were heavily "swabused" by the Senior Staff in softball, but held their own in the Ping Pong tournament. The Inner Circle Ceremony introduced even more into the Inner Circle, where elbowroom was already at a premium, and the Graduates Dinner toasts surpassed even last year's in satirical and laudatory poetry. We almost

became accustomed to the bizarre fashion of having one's boxers hang out from one's shorts, a fashion statement introduced by the Richmond contingent. which also boasted no less than five Yearmans this year. As we look back on the summer there are many other memories which come to mind: the presentation of a piano by the Unger family, Mr. Vitacco's slides to classical music, Mr. Stolle's innovative poetry reading campfire, and even just a casual game of tetherball or basketball. Mr. Morgan was very welcome in the last few days as he amassed information for the Birch Barks, his was surely an unforgettable performance of 'Barney Google' at Graduates Dinner.


In riflery I got my Marksman First Class and am working on my Sharpshooter. In archery I am going for my Silver Arrow.

AXEMANSHIP


