## Mowglis Pack History, 1989

Over 120 Mowglis boys and staff representing seventeen states and eight different countries comprised the 1989 season. There were many new faces and names to become acquainted with, and even a new language, Portuguese, in which many of the staff were able to communicate with a section of the Brazilian contingent after a remarkably short period of time, there being little alternative. But newness wears off quickly, and shortly all were on an equal footing. Industries began immediately, which were taught by a diverse and strongly veteran staff. Mr. Luis Molero brought his brother Fernando to camp this year from Mallorca, Spain, Mr. Vauthier joined us from Switzerland, and Mr. Fisher from Yugoslavia. Once again, Mr. Ventimiglia traveled all the way from Brooklyn to preside over the axemanship industry's demolition of the forest plant life, and Mr. Hoogenboom made it back from Munson Flats, Arizona (where he had been giving a fairly prolonged song recital) to lead the Madrigal Society to a three to nothing victory at the Saturday evening entertainments. The waterfront industries were among the most popular this year. Mr. Von Storch, assisted by Mr. Fortmiller and Mr. Sanchez, paddled about on the new additions to the canoeing fleet, as they instructed the boys in the art of the Jay stroke, the unswamp and the perfect tan. The sailing industry was augmented mid-season by a windsurfer, cannily purchased by Mr. Jeffers, who joined us from Richmond, Va., along with his wife Polly and daughter Rachel.

The rowboating industry enjoyed a renaissance of popularity under the tutelage of Mr. Duffy Yeatman, while swimming instruction was enhanced by the tandem team of archery instructors Mr. Bird and Miss Holman. We all enjoyed the long stretch of fair weather forecast daily by the weather industry. Trips went out right at the outset, and the Den led the way to the four and five thousand foot altitudes of the Franconia Range for a three day pack trip. Also in the Pemigewasset Wilderness lies the Bond Range, which Panther hiked for their first pack trip; both itineraries called for a stop at the natural waterslides at Franconia Falls. Baloo went on a base camp trip to Sandwich Dome, and Toomai frolicked at the Mt. Cardigan campsite. Akela found the Montalban Range to be the challenge of their Mowglis career, one only exceeded by that which their staff members faced as they watched the book time for the hike be tripled by the leisurely pace of the participants. Back in camp the normal routine of the daily schedule was broken up by the special events on Saturdays: Landsports, Watersports and Woodsmans Days, all very thoroughly planned by the Messrs. Yeatman, Ringe and Merrill. These days far outshone any of previous years and were filled with myriad and innovative activities, especially the obstacle course, which was called back for a repeat performance. Somewhere in the vicinity of the weekends were the feature length films, classics like Hoosiers, Superman, and the Bridge Over The River Kwai.



Sundays were always pleasant to anticipate, as they provided the opportunity to enjoy alternate club activities such as Ham Radio, Skibiscuiting, Adventure Games, and the decade-old Classical Music and Croquet. Sunday Chapel always provided a time for reflection.

Saturday evening in the second half of the summer brought the inevitable Saturday evening entertainment, meticulously rehearsed and fluidly performed by a wide variety of Mowglis boys and staff. David Master played masterfully on the Steinway piano given by the Beal family this year. Panther got the thumbs up signal and quite a hand for their Yellow Fingers skit. Mr. Merrill donned his straw hat and along with Mr. Cerwinski wondered where, oh where were you last night, and Mr. Morgan's dog Kelly got more applause for just being there than he did. On the subject of Mr. Morgan, it was great to hear that he was appointed to the Board of Trustees in this, his twenty-fifth year of association with Mowglis.

The second round of trips brought more challenging exposure to the wilderness: Den went up to the Connecticut Lakes on the Canadian border and saw an astonishing amount of Moose, half of Panther went on a four day trip to the Mahoosucs, and the other half went to Mt. Washington via the Montalbans. Squad week was here in no time it seemed, and the Washington and Gopher squads took on the Presidentials and stayed in the comparative luxury of the AMC huts, which they told us about for hours on end during their subsequent trip reports at campfire.

Campfires this year were diverse and very informative. Mr. Luis Molero told us about bullfighting and fandango dancing. Mr. Merryfield fired high powered rifles from his rather startling collection. Mr. Cooper lectured on European history. Mr. Bird on his firefighting experiences out west, and the sounds of John Philip Sousa, Beethoven and the Ink Spots were heard at the campfires devoted to musical cultural enrichment.

Crew week was full of excitement and hard work in the crew boats. Mr. Don Merrill coached tirelessly, and all eight boats had the rewarding sensation of feeling the boat come together as a team. Towards the end of the week the excite-

ment grew, as did the bonfire under the loving hands of Mr. Merrill, Mr. Ventimiglia and their Junior Staff assistants. Skits and cheers fired up the dining room and on Friday night the fire was ablaze as the crew shirts were handed out. Saturday brought a sweep for the Reds in a series of very exciting races. After the stroke's oar had been raised and congratulations and handshakes exchanged, it was the consensus of all that this year's Crew Week had been one of the most exciting and fun we could remember, thanks to Crew Leaders Yeatman and Ringe and Coach Don Merrill.

So many things make each Mowglis summer different from years past, even here where tradition and custom play such an important role. The two stake trucks, the red and the black, certainly stood out, as did the twenty cubs on opening day, and all five Yeatman brothers. It is the people especially who make Mowglis a great place, the people whom one gets to know so well through all the weeks together. This year's Den was exceptional in their leadership and citizenship, and each individual Denite contributed much to the community.

This year's Junior Staff is certainly worthy of mention and it may be that the dedication of the Madrigal Society's tune "Slow Motion Time" was a bit hasty, or maybe not, but the members of the JS did play a prominent role in industries, the dormitories and the maintenance of the physical plant.

Only at Mowglis could you hear English, French, German, Portuguese, Spanish and Japanese in a single morning and only at Mowglis could such a cultural diversity work so well to produce an experience of such quality and depth. We are all, truly "the best". Good Hunting all, and stay in touch, with Mowglis, and with each other.

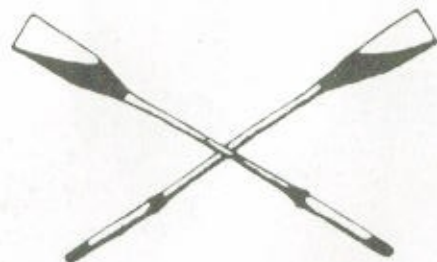

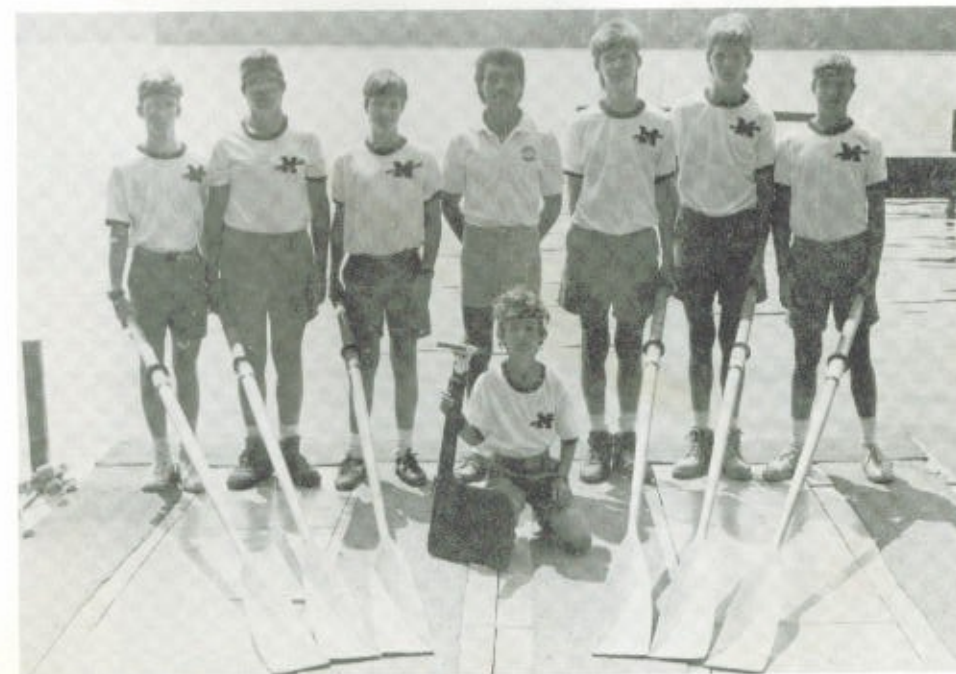

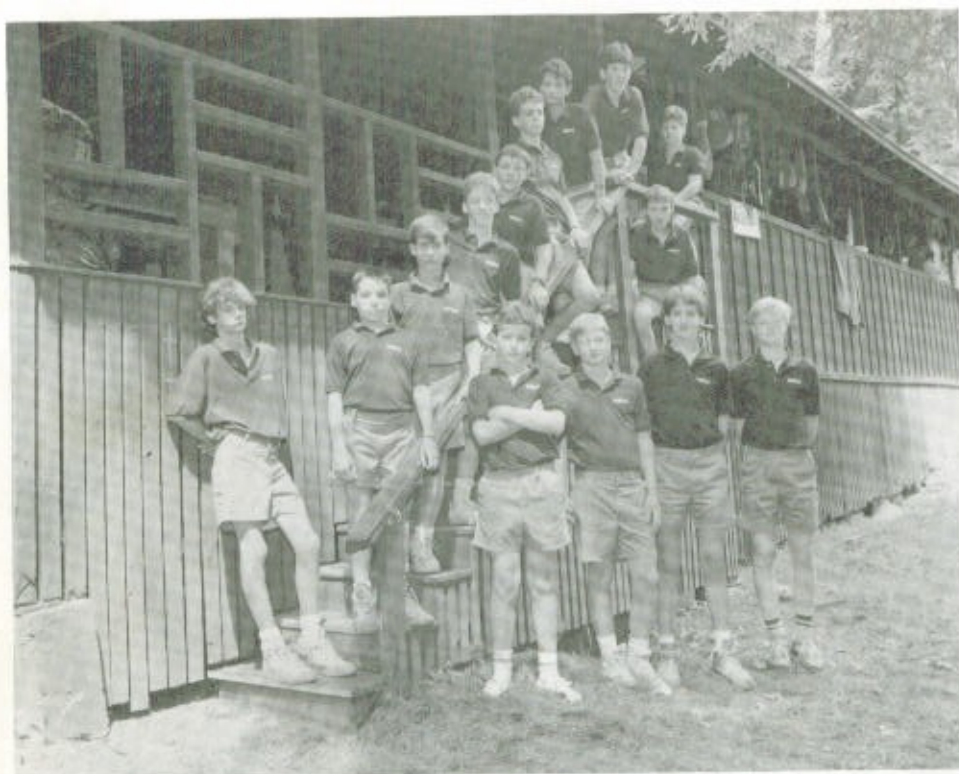
