



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

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### FROM THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD . . .



### Nationwide Director Search to Begin in January:

You have all received the announcement of Pete St. John's appointment as interim Program Director for the 2009 Mowglis season. We are indeed fortunate to have someone with his qualifications and skill available to run the camp. The "interim" designation reflects that the selection, while competitive, was limited to a few people with the ability to start work immediately. We plan a broad, national search before making a permanent appointment.

Running a summer camp like Mowglis is a diverse and challenging job. The person we're looking for is a strong and energetic leader who will earn the trust and respect of campers, staff, parents, and alumni. Our Director must be a strong communicator, with excellent speaking and writing skills. The job demands someone who is well organized and highly motivated, with the skills needed to oversee the camp's business, recruiting, and outreach operations. But most important, a successful candidate has previous camp experience and has worked extensively with young people. He is thoughtful and knowledgeable, with high

personal standards, good judgment, and a sense of humor.

The national search for a permanent Director will begin formally on January 5, 2009. An announcement letter will be sent to the Mowglis, Onaway, and Pasquaney communities, seeking qualified applicants. We also plan job postings on the American Camping Association Web site and several other key outdoor education sites. In the following months members of the Selection Committee will evaluate incoming applications and interview each candidate by phone and in person. The final interviews and selection will be made in May at the spring meeting of the Mowglis board.





# THE YEARLING PROGRAM



The Yearling Program was originally offered to older boys several decades ago. We resurrected it in the past few years with the help of dedicated Mowglis alumni and, of course, the young men who participate in the program.

### WHAT IS THE YEARLING PROGRAM?

It is an ideal opportunity for young men, ages 15 to 17, to gain a basic understanding of adventure sports and leadership. Over the course of three weeks, in a small group and almost completely outdoors, these young men gain serious outdoor skills and learn from natural consequences, becoming stronger individuals who evolve into a high performing group. The boys come together to experience Mowglis in a new way – not as campers or staff, but as a group seeking adventure.

In 2008 we had six Yearlings, led by Hunter Nadler and Mike Bartlett. In addition to the four main program activities, they also went whitewater rafting in Maine and cleared the brush between Gray Brothers and the lower tennis court in record time. Here is a quote from the 2008 trip log on the second day of whitewater rafting on the Kennebec River:

"the dam was letting out eight thousand CFS of water, which made the rapids huge. Everyone was really excited because all the guides were really excited, which meant that it must've been something big. The rapids had giant waves and really strong currents. We always steered towards the biggest waves and crashed into them, sometimes folding the raft. It was exciting to launch off the waves, it was the coolest thing I've ever done! We stopped half way and ate lunch, which was amazing: steak, cookies, and veggie stir-fry. Then we left and had a huge water fight with all the other boats. Then we got back to Adventure Bound and we watched a movie and a slide show of our rafting day. This place is awesome! (Britty Beal & John Mauran)."



### WHAT DO YEARLINGS DO?

The Yearlings are an independent, self-sufficient unit at Mowglis. They live on their own, usually at Cub Point, and cook most of their own meals. More than half of their nights are spent on the trail or in campgrounds. The group comes back to base camp at Mowglis only to swap out gear, do laundry, and take showers.



There are four main activities during the three week program:

**Top-Rope Climbing** – learning proper anchor setups, how to belay, and different climbing techniques; and potentially a multi-pitch in small groups, either at Rumney or Cathedral Ledge.

Whitewater Kayaking – paddling kayaks for four days on the Deerfield River in Massachusetts through rapids, surfing waves, catching eddies, and learning to Eskimo roll out of a flip.

Mountain Biking - enjoying the exhilaration of coursing down one of the many local mountain

trails.

Hiking in the White Mountains – hiking for four to five days out on some of the most

In addition to learning about and experiencing these sports, developing group dynamics and leadership roles, Yearlings gain valuable training on safe travel in the backcountry. This builds a foundation of confidence when it comes to trying new things or solving problems back home, at school, or work.

spectacular trails available.

### THE PROGRAM GOING FORWARD . . .

In the past, Mowglis has offered the Yearling Program just once during the camp season. Now the plan is to expand the program to two back-to-back sessions, one starting on June 28th, the second on July 20th. This multi-session setup allows older boys who might have high school sports or other summer commitments the chance to come to Mowglis for part of the season and go on an amazing adventure with old and new friends.

### IN REMEMBRANCE

reflections from Charlie Walbridge

### **CLYDE H. "MICKEY" SMITH**



I first met Clyde H. "Mickey" Smith in 1959, when I was an 11-year-old Akelite. His story was a Mowglis legend. He met Colonel Elwell in the 1930s as a boy on Mt. Cardigan, where his father, Clyde F. Smith, was the fire lookout. His family lived in a rough cabin just below the summit from spring until fall.

Each weekday Mickey hiked eight miles to and from Canaan to attend school. Growing up in the New Hampshire mountains, he developed a rare appreciation of the outdoors.

Mickey's father later became a noted craftsman and sign maker. His elegantly rustic signs guided hikers and visitors to trails and parks throughout the Appalachians. He made signs for Mowglis trails in the Cardigan region as well as the sign that has marked our front entrance for over 40 years. Once, while helping him place a trail sign in the mid-60s, he told me about the day he realized that his son had become a stronger hiker than he, leaving him behind on a steep climb. Clyde Sr., the consummate trailman, died while maintaining the Appalachian Trail near Roan Mountain in 1976.

The Colonel invited Mickey to attend Mowglis, and he was a successful camper, counselor, and tripmaster. When Mr. Adams was Director, he often returned to give slide shows of his travels. These were elaborate multimedia presentations with several projectors and recorded music. In the 60s he led several Washington Squads, including my own in 1962. Our final day included a challenging climb up the Huntington Ravine Trail and a final trek across Mt. Washington to Mt. Jefferson and down the Caps Ridge Trail. I doubt if we would have tried a hike that challenging without his sure-footed presence! He later became a trustee and a close advisor to Mr. Hart.

Mickey was an accomplished mountaineer who made challenging treks through the White Mountains, the Adirondacks, Mexico, and South America. When I became involved in whitewater sport, I learned that he was also a fine canoeist. Trained as an architect, he became a nationally known outdoor photographer. Some of the pictures he showed us in Gray Brothers found their way into books, magazines, and calendars. Amazon.com lists two dozen of his books still in print, each one showcasing a different part of the Eastern outdoors and Alaska.

During the last few years Mickey's health was not good, but his love of Mowglis never flagged. At last year's Back-to-the-Pack Weekend he treated us to a moving video retrospective of his childhood at the summit of Mt. Cardigan. His Christmas card to me enthusiastically described his latest book about the new Northern Forest Canoe Trail from Old Forge, New York, to Fort Kent, Maine. His loss will be deeply felt by many Mowglis and outdoorsmen throughout the country.



# JEAN ELLEN (BAKER) BENGTSON

Jean Bengston, the camp nurse for many years, died peacefully on Friday, August 29 after a long illness. She was 82.

When Mrs B. was just six years old she told her grandfather, a physician, that she planned to become a nurse and a mother. She stayed true to those goals her entire life. She was an emergency room nurse for over 20 years, thriving on

the fast pace and challenge of the the job. She raised three fine sons: Bob, Rick, and Craig. All were graduates and counselors with an important place in Mowglis history.

Her association with Mowglis began in 1968. She lived in Ansonia, Connecticut, near Mr. Hart, the then camp Director. They both went to the same church and knew each other well. Her husband was in the Coast Guard and was gone for most of the summer, so when Mr. Hart asked her to become the camp nurse, she agreed. She held the job from 1968 to 1973, dealing with the scrapes, illnesses and occasional serious problems of each camp season with grace and skill.

She really understood boys, knowing when to offer support and when to send a slacker packing. Her youngest son, Craig, was going for his Red Ribbon in canoeing while still in Baloo. He was a little guy, just 9 years old, but unusually determined and focused for his age. Mr. Hart had already questioned me about his fitness for the upcoming whitewater trip, and I assured him that he was ready,

On the morning of the trip, I dropped by the Lodge to pick up the first-aid kit. Mrs B. greeted me by the door. She said in a loud voice, "Charlie, Craig is sick. He has a tummy ache." Then she pulled me aside and whispered, "Charlie, he's scared! But he'll kick himself if he misses the trip. Get upstairs and talk him into it!" I went upstairs, sat down on his bed, and told him that I knew that tummy aches often cleared up fast. I suggested that he ride to the river with us. The river ran right along the road, so he could see it first. If he still felt sick, he could stay in the van.

Needless to say, he didn't feel sick that afternoon, and he didn't want to paddle with me. He had a great trip! I wasn't surprised to hear, many years later, that he had become Peter Jennings's producer!

In her final years Mrs. B dealt with failing eyesight with her usual energy and persistence. She had many friends and often came to Mowglis to watch the Saturday night programs. She will be missed by many Mowglis who benefitted from her solid, calming presence.
