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

1996 Mowglis History

Space precludes a more complete recital of Dick's impressive achievements during a distinguished career as an artist and teacher. As one of his colleagues has written, he was "on the cutting edge of the Native American art movement that added vibrance, fluidity and dimension to the flat-painting style of the early 1900s, a style in which he was schooled and which he admired."

With his rendering of the Kipling scene at the Council Rock and the mural of Mowgli with his friends, Kaa, Baloo, and Bagheera, the camp has a priceless remembrance of Dick's talent as an artist. The boys who were campers during his staff years became keenly aware of the Cheyenne traditions, and some of them became quite proficient in the dances which he taught them.

WAHPAHNAHYAH (Lightfoot Runner)
1912-1996

From Rick West, Jr., Director of the National Museum of the American Indian, Smithsonian Institution, came the sad news of his father's death on May 3, 1996, following a long illness.

Dick, as we all came to know him at Mowglis, joined the Mowglis staff through the efforts and interest of his friend, Edmund C. Shaw, himself a staff member. He arrived in 1939 and remained through three successive seasons. In 1976, he and his wife Rene came for a short visit which lasted long enough for Dick to refurbish the stage curtain and murals which he had created in 1940.

In 1942 Dick joined the Navy, became a commissioned officer, and continued in the U.S. Naval Reserve until his retirement in 1962.

The 1996 Mowglis season began with wet and cool weather upon us. Little could we know that similar weather would persist throughout much of the summer, yet it would take more than Mother Nature to dampen the spirits of the Cubs and Pack. The diverse and plentiful multinational staff did an outstanding job of maintaining the boys' high spirits while the junior staff kept the physical plant running smoothly. Trips went out in spite of the weather, starting with the Connecticut Lakes trip for the Den and covering other popular spots such as Montalton Ridge for Akela, the Bonds and Mahoosics for Panther, while Toomai conquered Sandwich Dome. Baloo went to Cardigan and Campion Falls and the Cubs went to both Cliff and Belle Islands. There were also many day trips which included a newly energized trail clearing effort to reclaim the Elwell Trail, excursions to the Rock Barn and Science Center, while the red ribbon trip took a new turn embarking on a guided running of the Errol Rapids on the Androscoggin River.

A renewed sense of Mowglis spirit seemed to prevail even though the camp was filled with many new personalities, campers and staff alike. The Denites took their roles as senior campers seriously as they endeavored to complete their Graduation Requirements and at the same time, tackle probably the most ambitious Den Project ever, the rejuvenation of the Gray Brothers field bank near the croquet court. The junior

staff took to their duties in a dedicated fashion and they achieved much more than would seem possible given their small numbers, not the least of which was a new leach field for the septic system. The senior staff competently balanced dorm counseling, activity instruction, C.O.D. responsibilities, reports, staff meetings and evening programs. We were treated to a visit by the Hebron Fire Department, "Skip" Riley and his weaponry, Mr. Derum's "down home" storytelling, Mr. Bickerdike's tales of his expedition to Nepal, the infamous potato cannon of Mr. Popinchalk and movies that ranged from *The Hunt For Red October* to *Jumanji*. Mr. Feuer spoiled us with his bugling after a two year absence, the whole camp went to see the fireworks at the foot of the lake on the fourth of July, and everyone enjoyed Mr. Dietz and Mr. Hart's new ski boat.

The first annual Mowglis Gladiators Day took place along with old favorites such as Landsports, Watersports and Woodsman Days. The boys learned intensive lessons in sportsmanship and cooperation as inspection points accumulated and ice cream was awarded, all while the music we hold dear here at Mowglis was passed on with the help of Mr. Hart Sr. on piano and Mr. Morrison's irrepressible warbling. As we passed the halfway point and said goodbye to the four week campers, the water temperature finally rose above freezing and the whole camp took to





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


Fireworks



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Waterskiing

My First Pack Trip




Crew Week
