Mowglis Pack History 2005

The summer of 2005 started under sweltering heat and humidity. Record temperatures in the mid-90s made the waterfront an even more popular location. Every camper was thrilled to complete his swim test as a way to beat the blistering heat. While we had our traditional reading of the first chapter of the *Jungle Book* for our first proper campfire, two of the first three evenings saw us enjoy a night-time soak.

On our Opening Day Ceremonies, five Cubs fired the cannon to welcome the start of another Mowglis summer. Mr. Bengtson reported to us that, although the camp was founded in 1903, the summer of 2005 was actually the 100th season for the camp due to a few summers when the camp did not run. With 53 campers enrolled, we were ready to make the 100th season a memorable one.

Industries soon began and the usual suspects—riflery and swimming—were the most popular activities. The lake was so popular that the Baloo Cove raft decided to go on a tour of Newfound. Thanks to the tireless efforts of Mr. Mitchell, we were able to recover the wayward raft after a few days.

With the first week under way, boys quickly settled into the rhythm of a "regular Mowglis day." Duties, industries, inspection, and soak made the time go quickly. The Cubs jumped out to an early lead in inspection, but the other dorms quickly found their way to keeping the camp clean. Mr. Nieto used his campfire to teach us about the intricate planning involved in D-Day, and soon the first Thursday arrived. Trip Day was here and the entire Pack landed at Mt. Cardigan. Every dorm summitted and enjoyed the great views from the fire tower.


Our first week ended with a visit to Onaway to celebrate the 4th of July. The weather was perfect as we enjoyed games, good food, and good people. As our time was nearing its end, many of the boys and staff enjoyed an impromptu dance with the Onaway girls.

Week two was trip week, with all dorms departing on overnight camping adventures. The heat and humidity of the first days turned to rain for the second week as all boys and staff slugged their way through soggy and wet trails and campsites. The Den powered through the Carter-Baldface trip, while both Panther groups back-packed through the Bonds. The other dorms enjoyed base camp trips as Akela went to Paugus Mills to tackle Mt. Chocorua, Baloo scaled Sandwich Dome, and the Cubs and Toomai returned to Mt. Cardigan. After the boys returned home, they presented outstanding trip reports, and Grev Brothers and the dining hall both began to fill with songs, as true Mowglis spirit was blossoming.

The third week saw the start of the second industry rotation, but ribbons were already starting to be earned. Four boys walked away with their Blue Ribbons, and one Pantherite earned his Red, White, and Blue. We knew this was going to be a summer of great accomplishments. Crew practices started for all boys, and excitement mounted with the coming of the first Visiting Weekend.

A beautiful sunny day greeted our parents as we went down to the Waterfront for Water Sports Day. Although the Australian Vipers swam to an early lead, the Jamaican Jaguars closed the gap and eventually won the day. Dueling for third place were the Cambodian Cadillacs and the Sudan Sedans. The evening entertainment had something for everyone. Rock music echoed through Grey Brothers as three campers performed music they had composed themselves. But classical sounds from piano and cello also wafted through the air. The East Hebron Madrigals brought back *The Pope*, and Ikki's Improv Troupe performed the finale for the night.

The fourth week saw the second round of trips, this time to nearly perfect weather. Den paddled on the Connecticut Lakes and

Although hail, rain, and snow greeted them, conditions were absolutely stunning when they summitted Mt. Washington. Views that extended for 120 miles made this a trip to remember for a lifetime. The week ended with Woodsman's Day as the weather was again perfect. This time, the Cambodian Cadillacs squeaked out a victory by just two points.





MR. CHALITA



TRIP DAY


We hiked Mt. Chocorua this past Thursday. I liked the food on the trip and had a lot of fun with all of the new friends I have made.

Our 2nd overnight trip was a lot of fun. We went to Emerald Pool and jumped off the cliff into the natural pool. The food was fantastic!






CREW

MAHOOSUCS



On the last day we hiked for just about two hours to the road, where we waited for three hours. It was a great trip and we had great weather. I think I would like to do it again.



We will remember with happy thoughts the warm summer days, sun kissed faces and mosquito bitten legs.


As the Cubs all pulled together to have a summer of a lifetime, they learned to work as a team. Miss Breen, I'm sure, won't be forgetting it in a hurry!


