

Seven shots of the cannon started off the Mowglis Summer, and it all went by too

fast from there. The first days of camp brought swim tests, Industry selections, soaks, and campfire programs. Returning boys felt the familiarity of a Regular Mowglis Day, while new boys soon became accustomed to the Mowglis routine. The Axemenship Boys were in good form at the start and continued clearing the White Footed Mouse trail. Riflery, under the guidance of Wright, Billingslea, and Bennett, started the season with bangs and pings.

Brook, Baloo experienced a quiet corner in Crawford Notch. Akela hit the Ethan Pond trail on their first pack trip of the summer. And the first Trip Day had the dorms scale the steep slopes of Crawford Notch.

Some very good campfire programs by the Senior Counselors ensued, performing live music, the first of several Aztec Dancing sessions by Mr. Gutierrez, Mr. Ploof's garden presentation, and Bristol Beach fireworks set the standard for this summer's evening programs.

By week two Industries were in full swing, Mowglis crew boats were on the water, old friends had been reunited, and everyone was making new friends - all while exploring new cultures within the community. Standing on the Baloo tetherball court before taps you could hear dorms reading books, the shuffling of beds as blankets were added on the cool nights, or you may have heard the "Hey, where did you put my duct tape?" coming from Toomai.

Panther had spectacular skies on the Franconia Ridge Pack trip. Toomai drove off the storms as they paddled to Belle Island for their first overnight of the summer. The Den conquered the Carter and Bald Face ridges on a classic Mowglis four-day pack trip. Formations of the athletic teams, The Teddy's Tater Tanks, Regan's Relish Wreckingballs, and Jackson's Pickle Jackhammers. The first of the sports days was upon us, the Axemenship boys were ready, and Woodsman Day took place on a hot Saturday afternoon.

The gun show, an amazing trivia game by our "senior" Junior Counselors, realistic reading of the *Jungle Book*, trip reports and the first movie night kept the stellar campfires rolling.

The bear returned to the dumpster during the third week of camp, though it seemed he was just passing through this year. Counselors moved dorms for the first time. The Junior Staff had their first taste of civilization after two weeks of doing what it takes to keep camp in top shape and well fed! The second round of Industries began on a Regular Mowglis Day, ending with an EMT campfire by Mr. Medina Mora and Miss Audrey.

Toomai was off to the Mount Cardigan base camp, Akela headed out on the trail again to the Kilkenny Ridge, and the Denites did see a moose on the Connecticut Lakes trip. Parents had arrived at camp even before Akela returned from their hike. An afternoon of Industries with parents and families at camp got things off to a great start on parents visiting week-

end. Mr. Gutierrez lead a ceremonial evening program on Gray Brothers field, with counselors on the drums, counselors and campers joining in on the dancing. The dancing and energy was fantastic; campers and parents alike were all fortunate to be part of the experience. The watermelon tussle stole the show on Watersports Day, as



campers and parents crowed on the rocks to get a better view of the Beginners Area. Evening program in Gray Brothers exposed some of the hidden talents among the boys, with Nick Sears, Will Levin, Sam Poza, and John Mulliken all playing instruments. The Cubs showed off their dramatic talents in *Fairy Tale Gone Wrong*, and Baloo had a run in while on a camping trip in *A Huff and a Puff and I'll Blow Your Tent Down*. Two very impressive skits created by the dorms themselves with the talented and dedicated Drama staff facilitating the process.

We had several new campers arrive over the weekend. They adjusted to camp life rapidly and everyone was right back into Regular Mowglis Days before trips went out again. The Mahoosucs were navigated successfully by two Panther groups. Baloo went to base camp in Waterville Valley at the Sandwich Dome site where they spent time on the mountain and on the river. A performance by Mr. Shankweiler, reading *Huckleberry Finn*, Trip Reports, and a guest presentation by Jose Medina-Mora ('96) on sources of energy and demonstrated the pole changes at several locations within the campfire circle; made for a great end to the week's evening programs.

Seven Cubs joined us this weekend and soon took their place in line firing the cannon at Colors. The Third and final round of Industries got off to a racing start as boys were working towards Ribbon requirements as they have become proficient in many skills relating to their Industries. The Yearling Program began and the group departed camp after only one night at their campsite on the grounds. Backpacking and sea kayaking were in store for the Yearlings. The Washington Squad departed for a south to north traverse of the Presidential range, staying in the huts: Mitzpah, Lakes, and Madison. The Gopher Squad departed a day later bound for Mitzpah. Both groups experienced some storms and many great views. Trip day went to the Pinkham Notch area. The weekend brought a fun and exciting Landsports Day.

It was hard to believe that Crew Week was about to begin, and Mr. Gridley and Mr. Billingslea were selected to lead their crews throughout the week. After lots of hard work, sleepless nights, and comradery, the week was one for the record books. Crew spirit was high and crews were proud. No one was sure what the outcome would be, as everyone showed great improvement from last summer, and new boys caught on fast under the guidance of our Crew coach, Mr. Slusher. The sweat lodge allowed dorms to find common ground before the big weekend. We had a surprise visit on bonfire night by Peter Pasquaney. Many parents and guests took part in the festivities at the pep rally, racing crew presentations, and the lighting of the fire. All watched the Blue bandanna light first, and then speculated on the races to come.

Crew Day brought victories to both Red and Blue crews in various form races, with Blue winning the penultimate race in a very respectable time. A cookout for campers, counselors, parents and guests on the lower ball field was an event we will all remember, both for the food and the good energy. Once again, some of our musicians showed their skills while camp songs were sung in Gray Brothers during evening program. Toomai brought a new twist to *The Jungle Book* when some of the characters crash-landed at Mowglis and discovered they had a camp in *The Pack Takes a Vacation*. Panther brought us through staff training activities with some counselor personalities in their skit titled *Staff Week*. Both skits featured phenomenal performances and were facilitated by the stellar drama staff of Mr. Shankweiler, Mr. Popinchalk, and Mr. Theobold.

The final week of camp brought the beginning of the last Regular Mowglis Days of the season. The Red Ribbon Trip departed for the Androscoggin River and the rest of camp departed on trip day to Mount Cardigan. Then we were back in camp for the final days of regular Industries before a festive and delicious Graduates Dinner. Friday morning brought the close of Industries, where the last requirements and ribbons were earned until next season. The afternoon was full of tournaments and practices for the upcoming ceremonies, the first being the Inner Circle Ceremony. A day of packing and some camp time with the parents during the Tennis and Archery Tournaments went by all too fast, we closed it with a picnic supper before the Candlelight Chapel Service and Candleboat Ceremonies. The final day we celebrated all of the achievements and the Mowglis experience, which campers and counselors made the 2011 season another most memorable summer ever!

TIME FLIES



RIFELRY




WATER FIGHT



With more than eight summits, and 30 miles hiked in three days, the last night was spent enjoying the sounds of a brook next to camp and eating all the leftover food in one giant meal. The views from the summits were beautiful, and the trail was endless. Though we had just ended our hike, before we knew it, the next adventure was about to begin.

Once the Yearlings emerged from the woods it was off to North Conway for pizza and root beer. After showers at Pinkham Notch, and a quick stop at the gear shop, we were off to Bath, Maine for a week of sea kayaking. Arriving in Maine well after dark, the Yearlings set camp as quick as ever and were fast asleep. Morning came too quickly, and once our guide had gone over safety and how to pack the boats, we were paddling by 10:00 a.m. After navigating through a maze of islands we arrived at the island where we would make camp for the night. We prepared dinner, and then the evening breeze brought in rain. We awoke early to fair weather and made our way to our rest day's destination. After a long day of paddling (and even a nap at lunch) we arrived. Once camp was set up and dinner was in the works, the Yearlings had a chance to do some exploring.


