




To ensure the health and welfare of the boys, we are beefing up our nursing staff. The ever capable Nurse Kathy will be returning. Assistant nurse Ms. Diane will join the staff to help keep track of the inevitable scrapes and bumps to make sure that the boys have a healthy fun summer.

All of our counselors are extensively interviewed, background checked and vetted BEFORE they even make it to camp. Once at camp, they embark on a rigorous two-week orientation that includes training in Wilderness First Aid, how to handle campers who miss home, as well as myriad other sensitive topics like how to identify and stop bullying, teasing and social exclusion.... The list goes on and on. The bottom line is that we spare neither time nor expense to ensure that the summer Team consists of youth development professionals who are deeply committed to Camp Mowglis being amazing for our campers.

We will be sending out photos and bios of our 2018 Team via e-mail and will also be posting them at camp so you can get acquainted with this fantastic group of Mowglis Men and Women!





## TICK TALK

We are fortunate that Mowglis is on a beautiful 160-acre lakeside forest in the White Mountains. But the unfortunate reality of going into the woods these days is that, in addition to the natural beauty, mountain summits, and pristine flora & fauna, there are also ticks.

Ticks are small arachnids, part of the order Parasitiformes. Along with mites, they constitute the subclass Acari. Ticks are ectoparasites, living by feeding on the blood of mammals, birds, and sometimes reptiles and amphibians. Making matters worse, Blacklegged Ticks can carry and transmit a number of "tick-borne diseases" such as Lyme Disease. Fortunately, Blacklegged Ticks are very uncommon in our part of New Hampshire. Regardless, we take tick awareness and prevention very seriously.

All of our staff, from the nurses to the junior staff, are extensively trained on how to identify & prevent tick bites, and we have enlisted a NH non-profit called "Tick Free NH" to help make sure that our team is up to speed on latest on how to thwart these creepy little pests.



Wearing tick-repellent clothing, tucking long pants into socks, having long sleeves, using insect repellent, and staying to the center of paths, is the best way for people to prevent tick bites when they venture outdoors; and we pass this knowledge and these practices on to our campers, repeatedly, throughout the summer. Campers are instructed to do "tick-checks" multiple times daily.

We have copious amounts of bug spray (containing Deet) available but please also bring some from home. Also, we have had good results using the "Sawyer Products" permethrin clothing spray (available on Amazon) which you can apply to your campers clothing and shoes before camp. In addition, we have removed much of the low brush from areas that are frequented by campers.

Our tick removal policy is that any ticks that are discovered on a camper or staff member while at camp are to be removed by a member of our nursing team. One of our Wilderness First Aid certified counselors removes any ticks discovered while out on hiking trips (they all have this certification). All ticks, whether they are removed at camp or in the back country, are sent to a lab and are tested for Lyme Disease. In addition, the site of the bite is marked and monitored for any signs of infection.

If you or your camper have any further questions about ticks, or if you have a family tick policy that differs from ours, please feel free to give us a call or e-mail. While there's a real threat posed by ticks, with prior planning, ongoing awareness, and vigilance it is still possible to safely venture into the woods.

#### MAINTENANCE UPDATE

#### **HOPE-TO-BE:**

In the coming years, Mowglis will be undertaking a renovation to Hope-to-be, the iconic changing room at the waterfront. The concrete stairs have long-needed repair, and will be torn out completely and replaced. The building itself will be pulled back



from the water and the porch expanded. The process will take time, and the greatest care will taken to ensure that the renovations are done with the distinct nature and history of the Mowglis waterfront in mind.

A local surveyor has been hired to survey the entire waterfront, which is the first step in applying for the appropriate building and wetlands permits. Alumni Doug and Don Merrill (Den '78) will be helping with the creation of a "perched beach" to replace the concrete stairs, along with the excavation needed to move and reconstitute Hope-to-be.

Mowglis was fortunate to receive several donations of sailboats. Our moorings were already a bit crowded, and this influx has encouraged us to build a small floating dock system to house the new additions to the Mowglis fleet.



#### MANG:

Mang received a partial update around the turn of the century, which added a more modern bathroom. This season, we undertook the remainder of the needed updates. The interior walls were removed to create less living space for four-legged squatters. The walls will be sealed and painted and the electrical will be updated. Mang was also due for a new roof, which we decided to undertake now as part of the broader improvements.

#### **DISH ROOM:**

This summer, the Dish Room will have a new floor, fresh paint, and updated electrical. Perhaps most importantly, in cooperation with Hobart and Kittridge Equipment, Mowglis will have a brand-new dishwasher and stainless steel counters installed! The layout of the room will be adjusted to allow increased traffic.

In tackling all the plumbing and electrical for this project, we've decided to make some updates to the kitchen as well, improving hot-water access and replacing some aging pipes. We're also looking at some updates to the Dining Hall to brighten the room and improve air-flow.

#### **LODGE ROOF:**

The Lodge is one of Mowglis' oldest buildings. Originally it was the carriage house for the Barnard sheep farm. While a number of updates are planned in the coming years, the first is a new roof, to be undertaken this spring by the same contractor who built the new lower mines.

We'd like to give a special thanks to Mr. Eugene Morrison, whose support has made many of these projects possible this season.

## **IMPORTANT NEW POLICIES**

Being camp director means that you have to make changes in policy from time to time... And this year I've made three of them:



**Pocket knives:** Please do not bring them from home. We will be supplying campers who are in Akela and up with camping pocket knives for their pack-trips.



Magic and Pokemon Cards: We know they are fun games but these cards are valuable and inevitably lead to strife and unhappiness in the Dorms. We'll have lots of regular cards and board games available. We are asking campers to leave these cards at home.



**Dogs:** We LOVE dogs, but if you'd like to bring yours up to camp on pick-up, drop-off, or a Parent's Weekend please e-mail me ahead of time. While at camp, we require all dogs (including dogs belonging to employees) to be either on leash or contained by invisible fence, and all waste to be picked up and disposed of by their owner.
